Downtown hotel awaits new owner

Scarlett group makes offer for Best Western

The city is preparing for a changing of hands at the Best Western Premier Hotel and Convention Center downtown.

Scarlett Hotel Group of Chicago has an offer in place to purchase the North Main Street property on the Fox River, which has undergone improvements under Oshkosh's tax incremental financing (TIF) District No. 25. The Best Western Premier

has been operational since spring 2013 when it took over the City Center Hotel and the facility underwent a major renovation.

At the first Common Council meeting of February, the group approved changes to the TIF agreement, management agreement and parking agreement with the hotel and convention center to allow for this transition.

As part of the TIF creation at the time, the city entered into agreements with Oshkosh Investors LLC that provided a \$2 million upfront development assistance grant and \$1 million "pay-go" grant to

support the renovation of the hotel.

The agreements included operations for the Convention Center and operation of the attached parking structure, which became part of the Best Western Premier Waterfront Hotel and Convention Center.

In return for the full redevelopment of the Best Western Premier, the city was to provide payments for the remaining \$1 million of the agreement. Based on the original development, the \$1 million payment by the city was projected to have been fulfilled by around 2022.

Algoma road project secures funding

Leonard Point Road gets go-ahead for 2026 start

The Town of Algoma will see a new roadway much like Omro Road in the coming years thanks to a \$4.15 million allocation from federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) funds.

According to a report from the state Department of Transportation, Leonard Point Road has not been redone since 2001. The new construction is set to begin in 2026.

Town Administrator Richard Heath said the project is anticipated to have the same urban profile as Omro Road completed in 2021 with the same-size travel lanes, 5-foot bike lanes, curb, 7.5-foot ter-

race and 5-foot sidewalk.

"It's something new – most people still think Algoma is still a rural town," Heath said. "We have rural infrastructure for urban density. We're basically an extension of the cities, in simple terms. If you remember the old Omro Road, it had 11-foot travel lanes, a little bit of shoulder and steep ditches. Most people saw this as a loss of the rural nature of Algoma."

The project cost totals \$4,152,708 (80%) from the BIL and \$1,411,492 (20%) from the town, documents show. At the last Algoma Town Board meeting, the municipal agreement between the town and state was approved, which will

allow for design and engineering planning.

From here, Heath said there will be ongoing meetings with homeowners in the area to keep them informed on the process.

"I think it'd be a great addition to them in the future and help facilitate some of the development in that area more safely than it is now," Heath said. "We're excited about getting started. I think there's going to be more support for it than (Omro Road) because of all the development that's occurring at Old Apple Acres, Bellhaven and even into the Town of Omro."

Additionally, Heath said the new road will continue to encourage pedestrian-safe, nonmotorized transportation for those who live in the town, especially for students nearby who attend Oakwood Elementary School.

Top 10 sturgeon pulled from Winnebago

James Gishkowsky's enormous success on Lake Winnebago last week was only about a half-mile out from his Van Dyne home where he has been fishing and watching for sturgeon the past 20 years.

Gishkowsky landed the 177.3-pound, 77.9-inch female sturgeon Tuesday that he registered at Wendt's On the Water and turned out to be the seventh largest ever speared on the Winnebago system. It was the largest taken since a 179-pounder in 2013 that remains at No. 6 on the Heavy Hitters Club list.

A 212.2-pound sturgeon heads that list when it was taken in 2010.

The 75-year-old was drawn into spearfishing by his son and over the last two decades has caught about 10 sturgeon with the largest weighing in at 96 pounds. This season he started the first weekend farther out on Winnebago before staying closer to home that following Tuesday.

"On Saturday we speared about three miles out on the lake. Sunday, we speared four miles out, and because I was going to spear alone (Tuesday), we brought it right in front of my house about a half-mile out," he said.

Using cameras that rotate and shine into the 3-by-5-foot hole, Gishkowsky said he had turned away to regulate his stove and when he turned back, a sturgeon appeared that he knew was big.

"I thought it was going north and south and actually it was going east and west," he said.

He took his "shot in the dark" without knowing if he would hit it, watched the rope take off and knew he had made contact. It went about 25 yards and stopped, then led back to the hole where Gishkowsky got his first good look.

"I tried to pull him up and I could hardly lift him," he said. "So I give it a little bit and I got him up to as far as I could see him and, oh my God."

He called Shawn Wendt for help and in the meantime was able to tie off the rope and keep it in place before Wendt provided the extra lift for landing it.

The trophy catch will eventually hang at TJ's Harbor Restaurant north of Van Dyne, according to Gishkowsky, when it is finally mounted in about a year and a half.

Many who took to the ice found success on opening day Feb. 11, with 522 sturgeon harvested.

The Upriver Lakes harvest reached its 90-99% cap for adult females on Friday and those with tags were able to continue to spear until 1 p.m. Saturday, at which time Upriver Lakes spearing closed.

Spearmen with Lake Winnebago tags continued to harvest sturgeon this week until those harvest caps are reached. Paynes Point Hook & Spear Club south of Neenah reported between 12 to 14 inches of ice on the northern half of the lake with

the sun and warm temperatures honeycombing the top few inches.

Travel only by snowmobiles, ATVs and two-person UTVs is recommended. Snow is forecast for midweek, which will keep the sun off the ice.

The 2023 Winnebago sturgeon spearing season opened with good water clarity but ice conditions kept participation limited, according to the state Department of Natural Resources. Only about 3,100 shacks were seen during aerial counts on opening day, down significantly from almost 6,000 last year.

Workforce housing plan on Merritt advances

Workforce housing may be coming soon near the downtown YMCA after the city's Redevelopment Authority approved an option to work with NeighborWorks Green Bay.

The Redevelopment Authority (RDA) acquired 302 Merritt Ave. in 2016 from Winnebago County for the cost of back taxes (\$28,186) using Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds.

According to city documents, the city then demolished the blighted property. NeighborWorks Green Bay is now requesting an option to purchase the property for a \$1 option period fee. An option period is an agreed-upon amount of time where a potential buyer decides to make the transaction final.

The anticipated purchase price will be \$10,000, which is fair market value. NeighborWorks-Green Bay plans on developing the lot into a workforce housing unit.

Community Development director

Kelly Nieforth told RDA members that the city has owned the property for a long time and staff has been working with project partners over the past several years to develop infill lots throughout Oshkosh.

The city has previously tried to work with NeighborWorks Green Bay over a decade ago to develop affordable housing, but the organization did not have the capacity to do so at the time.

"Quite a bit has changed, and staff have been working with NeighborWorks more recently," Nieforth said.

Green Bay NeighborWorks has been in service since the 1980s, providing homeownership preparation services, down payment and closing cost assistance lending, and community-interest real estate development.

Planning Services director Mark Lyons said this effort has been focused on since the city's implementation of a major housing study completed last March.

Additionally, with the approval of the

option by RDA, Nieforth said NeighborWorks will need to return to the group for an official purchase of the property before beginning construction. She said they're hoping to start later this year.

NeighborWorks Green Bay director of real estate development David Erickson said the organization has been considering more developments in other RDA lots around the city.

Menominee Park facility options get public airing

The community is invited by the city's Advisory Parks Board and the Parks Department to give input regarding the proposed Menominee Park Beach/Bathhouse..

Thomas Karrels of architectural firm T.R. Karrels and Associates approached the board with three options to consider at a later meeting: renovating the existing structure, rebuilding the structure to be an updated replica of the original, or pursuing a new design altogether.

The building, regardless of what's chosen, will be about 4,100 square feet and accommodate equipment for the Otter Street Fishing Club.

All three options are set to include a shade structure that will cost about \$115,000.

The first choice to renovate and add on to the original structure, according to Karrels, has become more expensive than a

completely new build, priced at anywhere from \$1,275,000 to \$1,725,000.

The second option to rebuild with a similar design to the original 1913 architecture would cost from \$850,000 to \$1,150,000.

The last option the group looked at was to redesign the building and would need additional consult to settle on a final plan, Karrels said.

Discussion at the advisory parks meeting surrounded the idea of pursuing a structure that would match the architecture and aesthetic of the neighborhood. Members of the group indicated they would like to see a more comprehensive design of the third option before coming to a decision in addition to hearing from residents as well.

NAMI building repairs to stretch finances

The Oshkosh chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) is seeking funds to replace severe structural damage in their headquarters at 525 N. Main St.

NAMI Oshkosh executive director Mary Lord-Janness said board member Vince Pawlacyk first noticed the issue when investigating a low-hanging ceiling tile.

"When he took a tile off, he discovered severely deteriorated ceiling joists. It's a severe structural problem; it has to be fixed," Lord-Janness said. "This building is perfect for us. The location is right in the center of downtown and the size is perfect. The building's been brought up to date for our use; we're committed to this location."

Laib Restoration will be completing the fix and the bill will be \$72,000.

Lord-Janness said the drop ceiling and asbestos ceiling, heat ducts and electrical fixtures all have to come down for the repair. Work is set to begin March 6.

While the repair is underway, neighboring First Presbyterian Church has opened its doors to NAMI staff.

Lord-Janness said the structure was built in 1929 as the Checkerboard Cafe

and was a restaurant until 1970.

"With an older building, there's always going to be things that are coming up in the future," she said. "Luckily, our roof is fairly new and our furnace is fairly new. So hopefully, if we get these ceiling joists replaced and the building insulated, it's going to be a good, safe, perfect home for us for many years to come."

Feb. 28, 1884

Buffalo Bill Brings His Wild West Show to Oshkosh:

On this date, Buffalo Bill brought his live Wild West Show to Oshkosh's Turner Opera Hall, located on the corner of Jefferson and Merritt Streets. It was said the show drew a good crowd and did not disappoint attendees. The Honorable William F. Cody in a one-night only performance brought his troupe which included entertainers, noted marksman Captain Bogardus and "A Band of Genuine Sioux" including Red Cloud's niece and nephew. The program, "The Prairie Waif", is a drama founded upon a



series of events which are said to have occurred in the venturesome and romantic career of Cody himself. The Sioux Indians gave a parade on the streets earlier in the day, dressed in their native costume.

An article published the day of the event claims—"The manager desires it perfectly understood that there is nothing objectionable about the performance and that ladies need have no hesitation in attending" Tickets are on sale at Gunther's Drug Store.

Cannabis fine reduction in county gets panel review

The Winnebago County Judiciary and Public Safety Committee considered a proposal last week to reduce the county's fine for possessing up to 25 grams of marijuana to \$1.

The proposal, brought forward by District 6 Supervisor Brian Defferding, follows a resolution for a cannabis advisory referendum question to be on the county's April ballot, which failed to pass the committee last month.

Last year the Winnebago County Dis-

trict Attorney's Office issued a memo stating it was no longer criminally prosecuting personal use marijuana cases. Those cases can still be issued a citation. The DA's office will continue to prosecute people who are selling.

Defferding cited a 2021 Pew Research Study that found that 91 percent of U.S. adults believe marijuana should be legal for medical and recreational use. He noted the state Legislature is expected to consider cannabis legalization legislation in the upcoming term.

The committee discussed the proposal

to amend county code to reduce the fine to a dollar for simple possession of marijuana, cannabis and THC paraphernalia for 25 grams or less. People found with more than 25 grams would be subject to a felony under state statute.

Sheriff John Matz noted the county's fine for simple possession is about \$390, which includes court costs. If the fine reduction to \$1 was approved, the cost would be about \$116 with court fees included. The fee assessments are set by the state.

Matz told the committee he's concerned about the proposal due to the amount of marijuana that would be considered personal use.

"This is 25 grams, which is a substantial

amount from my perspective," he said. "We get into what we consider much more than personal use and more than just sharing with a friend."

He added that legalizing marijuana will not stop the illegal market.

"It doesn't stop the illegal growers and the illegal distributors," he said.

District 16 Supervisor Jacob Floam proposed postponing the discussion on the fine reduction until the committee's August meeting.

The committee voted 4-1 in favor of postponing, with Defferding voting against.

"I'm very much a pioneer and part of me really wants to push the state so I think it's time for us to act now," he said.

Toxic shock cases reported in state

Since July, the state Department of Health Services (DHS) has received five reports of toxic shock syndrome (TSS), with four cases associated with super absorbency tampon use by teenage females. No deaths have been reported.

TSS is a serious illness caused by bacteria that can produce toxins. In a typical year, Wisconsin sees zero to one TSS cases. The last confirmed TSS case in the state was in 2011.

TSS was first recognized in 1978 and was later associated with tampon use in adolescents and young menstruating women in most of those cases.

"Toxic shock syndrome can progress rapidly leading to complications such as shock, organ failure, and death," said State Health Officer Paula Tran.

Symptoms of TSS include sudden fever, vomiting, diarrhea, dizziness, muscle aches, low blood pressure, rash, and shock with multi-organ dysfunction. Treatment includes the use of antibiotics and supportive treatment to prevent dehydration

and organ failure.

DHS advises health care providers to be alert to the early signs of TSS in patients who use tampons. Providers must report cases of TSS, a category II reportable condition, to their local health department.

TSS is now known to be associated with other risk factors such as surgical wounds and childbirth.

Kobussen Buses still on the move at 85 years

Family business now serves 35 districts

It was 1937 when Elwood Kobussen – Grandpa Goldie – was chosen by the Kaukauna Board of Education to transport out-of-town students to and from Kaukauna High School.

The transportation company, marking its 85th anniversary this year, now operates in 35 school districts with 23 bus terminals and 994 vehicles. Sixty of them run for the Oshkosh Area School District with 2,361 students transported daily.

“We think that (Grandpa Goldie) would be incredibly proud of how far we have come,” said Samantha Kobussen, social media designer for the company.

With a fourth generation of the family now involved with the company, current president Joe Kobussen said “getting to 85 years as a family business has been exciting and it’s been challenging, but overall it has been fun.”

A dairy farmer and trucker by trade, Elwood Kobussen started with red, white and blue school buses. No buses were available for purchase during 1940-45 due to World War II. From 1945 to 1951, one bus was added every single year. After that, two were purchased annually.

James Kobussen, Elwood’s eldest son, joined the company and they eventually formed a father-son partnership in 1957.

In 1958, Kaukauna Mayor Joseph Bayoragoon requested that an inner-city route be established between Kaukauna and Appleton. The Kobussens were contracted to operate that transit system up until 1974, when the service became the current Valley Transit.

In 1962, the Kobussens became Kaukauna Bus Service Inc. Elwood was president, and James was vice president. Marion Kobussen, James’ wife, became secretary.

During the 1960s, the Kobussens took a progressive move at the time in hiring women drivers. This was a sensitive topic for northeast Wisconsin and elsewhere, but the Kobussens were proud of the drivers and had trust in them regardless of the era.

Eventually, Elwood’s youngest son, Michael, took over management of Neenah operations. Since then, Michael’s wife Ann, Ann Kobussen’s daughter Melissa,

and son Scott have all joined the business. Michael passed away in 2004.

In the early 1970s, the company started

a driver’s training program even though it was not mandated by the state. To complete the program, drivers were required to attend training and take road and written tests. During this time, James Kobussen became a certified driver training instructor and taught classes at Fox Valley Technical College. This practice continues today with all Kobussen drivers receiving skid pad training at FVTC, along with practice and additional training with skilled trainers at the bus terminals.

Kaukauna Bus Service officially became Kobussen Buses Ltd. in 1976. Not long after that in 1980, Outagamie County and Kobussen Buses started a contract to transport adults with special needs. This contract had been expanded to 11 vehicles.

Kobussen expanded into motorcoaches in 1983, which is also when Joe Kobussen, James’ middle son, joined on as a mechanic. With the addition of motorcoaches, Kobussen was able to, and still offers, chartered group trips through the U.S. and Canada.

James’ youngest son, Dan, joined the company in 1994. James and Marion retired in 1998 and his presidency went to Joe. Joe and Dan have taken over all management of Kobussen Buses and today own and operate it with their aunt Ann and cousins Scott and Melissa.

In 1995, Kobussen was nominated by the Wisconsin Council of Safety and Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations for the Wisconsin Corporate Safety Award based on compensation claim scores. Kobussen is the only bus company in northeast Wisconsin nominated for this honor. Kobussen Buses has always prided itself on safety and forward thinking.

UWO archives, research center hold property details

The continuing quest for information on our 100+ year-old house recently took us to the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh Archives & Area Research Center (ARC). Located on the third floor of Polk Library, this area, as the name suggests, contains two major collections.

If you read the Landmarks article about Harrington Hall by Joshua Ranger earlier this month in the Herald, information from the University Archives was used in that research. The archives contain documents, photographs and artifacts related to the 150-plus-year history of the campus, including the buildings.

The ARC is the second collection and is a regional collection of the Wisconsin State Historical Society. The collection includes non-current local government records for Dodge, Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Marquette and Winnebago counties. The State Historical Society established the first group of ARCs around the state in 1952. The ARC on the Oshkosh campus was included in the first group.



Records in the ARC include vital and naturalization records for the listed counties. These are valuable resources for those doing family genealogy research. Of importance to those researching building history, tax and assessment records are in the collection.

When researching a house, major increases in value shown on these records indicate that a major addition or renovation occurred. Historic and current tax record holdings are listed on the Archives & ARC website at archives.uwosh.edu. These records are not digitized and need to be accessed by contacting ARC staff. The Oshkosh Public Museum also holds tax and assessment records.

A valuable find for us were the records created by the Civil Works Administration. This was a Depression-era project and existed from 1934-1936. The goal of the project was to create a detailed inventory of the building stock of cities and villages. Some of these cards may

include a drawing of the footprint of the building (ours doesn't).

We did find out that our house had electricity in 1935, but no indoor plumbing. We've wondered for a while if our front porch has always been enclosed, as it currently is. In 1935 it was "glazed" (glass windows). There were two bedrooms, two rooms had wallpaper and the others were painted. We also found out the floors were not carpeted or tiled at that time and are made of pine and maple.

Without any old photos of our house, this was a way to get a written description from 90 years ago. You can search to see if there is a CWA record for your house under the genealogy tab on the website or at <https://polk.uwosh.edu/archives/courtrecords>. CWA records have not been digitized, but copies can be made at the ARC.

For more information or questions on any of these materials, visit the ARC on campus. Staff will not do research for you but will help you get started. Before your visit, make sure to check the hours on the website or call 920-424-0828, since hours vary with the university schedules.

Volunteer coaches at heart of youth basketball

Historically, Oshkosh has always had a crush on basketball, and given all the basketball taking place in this city as we head into March Madness, it's obvious that the crush has only become stronger with time.

It comes as no surprise that the Oshkosh Recreation Department's Youth Basketball League, now in its second year, is on track to become widely popular and highly successful. In its first year, 224 boys and girls in grades 1 through 6 participated; this season, that number has grown to 278.

A big part of this success, according to ORD program director Lori Gentry, is due to the efforts of the 30 volunteer coaches and countless assistant coaches who devote their time, energy and patience to the kids in this program.

According to Gentry, "Our volunteer coaches are the heart and the heroes of this program. They are the everyday people and parents who do their best to teach the fundamentals of basketball to children of any experience level in a fun, caring environment, and they do this by

focusing on our four core values: inclusion, skill development, family balance and lifelong enjoyment.

"Finding people to take on the role of coach is very challenging," Gentry says. "Coaching youth can seem overwhelming, but we work very hard to set our volunteer coaches up for success."

Tom Bradley, coach of the Hawks, a first- and second-grade team; and the Blazers, a third- and fourth-grade team, praises the ORD for the support he has received, describing the practice plans, schedule, first aid, basketballs and carrying bag as "cut and dried."

"It's all laid out so I can focus on kids and basketball," he says.

Elizabeth Bladorn, coach of the Lakers, a team of first- and second-graders, agrees.

"I love what the Oshkosh Recreation Department has done to support my coaching efforts," she says, explaining that "along with all the equipment, you get a detailed handbook with specific ideas and ways to structure your practice. I look at the plan before practice for about 15 minutes and come up with a rough draft of what will work and what we can still

work on from last week's plan.

"The practices and games fly by. I coached my son last year and I followed along with almost everything the handbook said to do in practice and I was able to see the kids improve, have fun, and still have my own spin on the activities if I wanted to."

Both agree that the two or three hours they invest each week in coaching are worth it. For Bradley, who feels that by coaching, he is giving back to all those who mentored and supported him while he was growing up, "one of the high points is definitely seeing the look on their faces when they accomplish a good pass or shot. The excitement and joy empower and transform them."

For Bladorn, the sense of reward comes in "seeing the kids improve their skills and work as a team. I love seeing how they get excited about making a basket. I love to see the kids learning something new and having fun doing it."

Bradley and Bladorn encourage other adults to volunteer for coaching positions in the future.

"Do it for your kids," urges Bradley. "Any extracurricular activity that you participate in benefits your child. In the midst of it, when you feel so busy, you wonder why you signed up to do it, but studies and my own experience shows that it's beneficial."

Bladorn adds, "If you feel like you want to change something about the game, become a coach. This is my first coaching experience, and my kids have been in sports for over three years. I am so glad I took the leap and just jumped at this opportunity. The only way to get kids to play basketball in this program is if they have a coach to lead them. I am still learning things and am excited to keep learning more."

"Anyone who has coached knows that the rewards hit you in the heart," says Gentry.

Costs associated with sewer repairs in the immediate area and additional costs to refurbish the seawall along the river to accommodate the Riverwalk required the city to borrow additional funds to pay for these infrastructure costs, which delayed those payments.

As a result, the city has only reimbursed about \$31,000 of the \$1 million obligation. Now that the city has paid off the infrastructure obligations, it is expected to be able to cover the remaining "pay-go" obligations.

Oshkosh gymnasts collect conference crown

It had been more than a decade since the Oshkosh co-op gymnastics team had been able to hoist a conference championship trophy.

That all changed Friday night when the group assembled around the awards podium inside the Oshkosh West gym to showcase the Eastern Valley Conference championship plaque the team had earned. It was the first conference title since 2010 and one that head coach Leah Levine believes is the net result of the hard work the team has put in all season.

"To see these girls work so hard and to see it finally pay off, I'm just excited for them," Levine said. "They deserve it."

Oshkosh won the title in convincing fashion as well.

The team's meet total of 130.550 was nearly five full points ahead of runner-up Valders/Roncalli (125.750) while Manitowoc Lincoln was a distant third with 122.925. Oshkosh also went 5-0 in conference dual meets to help claim the title.

Oshkosh also sported the top two scores in the all-around competition and three of the top six.

Senior Olivia Navin posted the top total with a score of 34.150, while freshman Lydia Barr finished second with a score of 33.250. Junior Rayleigh Okon took sixth overall with a score of 31.800, just .025 short of making the podium.

"I think they should feel amazing and I think it speaks volumes for who they are," Levine said. "They work so hard in the gym and they always have great attitudes."

Oshkosh turned in the top team score on two different apparatus at the meet.

On the balance beam, the team totaled 33.925 – roughly 3.5 points more than any other team – led by a 1-2-3 finish from Barr (9.050), Navin (8.850) and Okon (8.400), respectively. Parker Asen added a 7.625 for their fourth score.

Oshkosh also posted the high score on the vault with a team mark of 33.500, with Navin winning the event with a score of 8.750. Sarah Penzenstadler finished fifth to earn a medal with a score of 8.350, while Asen (8.250) and Barr (8.150) rounded out the Oshkosh scores.

"I think it was a good vault night for us,"

Reeves places eighth in diving at state

River Reeves didn't have any expectations entering the diving competition at the WIAA Division 1 State Swimming Meet at Waukesha South High School on Saturday.

The Oshkosh North/Lourdes Academy freshman was in his first season as a diver so simply making it to the state meet was an accomplishment in itself.

"I was just mostly going for fun," Reeves said. "I wasn't really looking to compete with anyone and was mostly just going for the experience."

It turned out to be quite the experience. Reeves surprised himself by finishing eighth among the 24 divers with a score of 393.55 and came away already looking forward to more success in the future.

"After I found out I did so well, I was re-

ally happy," Reeves said. "I was trying to be as calm as I could. Trying to get through every dive with all my precision and trying to nail everything."

Reeves was the top finisher among the three freshmen in the field, while also finishing ahead of two divers that placed ahead of him at the Fox Valley Association and the sectional meets earlier this month. His state total was about 32 points ahead of Ryan Foucault of Neenah and 41 points ahead of Drew Schmitz of Appleton North/East.

"I was surprised when I found out the scores and that I beat them," Reeves said. "I thought they were scoring better than I

was."

Reeves entered the state meet seeded 13th in the field and was 12th after the preliminary round of dives.

That moved him into the semifinals, where he jumped four places to eighth and held that spot through the remainder of the dives. He said his final dive, an inward double, was his best dive of the meet and helped him reach his final total.

"After the first cut I looked at my points and I was ahead of lots of the other divers and some of the people from my sectional. That was like, 'I'm getting up there,'" Reeves said. "I was getting all of my dives down and making all of the points."

Although this is Reeves' first season of competitive diving, he did bring some experience to the sport when he joined the

Levine said. "There were highlights on everything else, but it was definitely a vault day."

Oshkosh finished second on the uneven bars and third on the floor exercises but was the only school that topped the 30-point mark on all four rotations.

In addition, six different gymnasts had a routine score used throughout the night as Oshkosh was able to spread out the scoring across the team.

In addition to those who scored on vault and balance beam, Ja'nyiah Ford had the team's third highest total on the floor exercises.

"It shows the team aspect of everything that goes on," Levine said. "It shows everybody is supporting everybody and everybody is cheering everybody on."

Oshkosh will now turn its attention to the WIAA Division 1 sectional meet which will be held Saturday at Manitowoc Lincoln.

Oshkosh had just one individual state qualifier last year in Navin and hasn't qualified as a team for state since 2012, but coming off the strong showing at the conference meet the potential to be well-represented at the state meet at Wisconsin Rapids is there.

"I just tell them every meet is a new challenge," Levine said. "The next five practices we'll just keep working hard, take one day at a time and then next Saturday, we will do the best we can."

West's Schneider, Martell punch tickets to state meet

Oshkosh West wrestling coach Matt Cuadra admitted that going into the WIAA Division 1 sectional meet at Oshkosh North on Saturday, his team's season could be over by meet's end.

Based on seedings and past matchups, the Wildcats weren't supposed to advance anyone out of the tournament and to the WIAA State Wrestling Meet.

Ryland Schneider and Garth Martell changed that narrative.

Schneider finished second at 132 pounds and Martell was the runner-up at heavy-weight as both wrestlers will advance to this week's state championships at the Kohl Center in Madison.

"It's an awesome opportunity for those guys," Cuadra said. "This is the best sectional in the state and both guys had to beat guys we weren't supposed to beat – guys who had higher rankings than us – and they did that."

Schneider, a sophomore, will be making his second trip to the state meet. He lost two matches at state a year ago but believes he will be better prepared this time around.

"I was really overwhelmed by how many people were there (last year) and this year I will tune it out and wrestle my hardest,"

Schneider said. "It feels great. Just have to keep wrestling my hardest and whatever happens, happens."

Schneider pinned Henry Gugala-Reinders of Menasha in 53 seconds to open the tournament and advance to the semifinals where he collected a dramatic 7-5 victory over Neenah's Jayden Sheppard.

Schneider trailed 3-2 after the first period and was down 5-3 with less than a minute to go in the match. He scored an escape with 46 seconds left and earned a stalling point with 11 seconds left to tie the score.

He then notched the winning points with a takedown with three seconds re-

maining.

"We had the gameplan of just pushing the pace the whole time and how hard Ryland works, we knew we would end up on top," Cuadra said.

The final takedown was the first time Schneider led in the match.

"I just kept thinking to myself I was going to win," Schneider said. "I thought that the whole time and it ended up happening."

Schneider fell to Kaukauna's Bryce Winans in the title match and secured second place when Sheppard won his third-place match.

Schneider (35-15) will face Milton's Ty-

son Peach (47-1) in his first-round match at state.

"Getting to the Kohl Center the first time there is a big shellshock so (going back) I think it will make a world of difference," Cuadra said "Now he knows what it's like. Now we are there to do business and not just there to be there."

Martell had maybe even a more challenging route to earn his state trip.

He used a third-period takedown to earn a 3-2 win over Kaukauna's Ben Krueger in the first round and then faced a 3-1 deficit against Menasha's Cason Quick entering the third period. Quick entered the match with just one loss on the season.

Martell was able to get an escape midway through the period to get within a point. Then, with just two seconds remaining in the match, Martell finished off a takedown that took Quick to his back for two near-fall points and a huge 6-3 win.

"I knew I needed a last-second takedown there," Martell said. "When we got to that even position and we were both on our knees, I just smelled blood in the water and I knew I needed to get after that."

Martell knew it was the win he needed to earn his first state trip.

"There's always a lot of the what-ifs, but after that match, I was set up pretty well to go," Martell said. "It means so much. This has been my goal all season long."

Martell would lose in the title match to nationally ranked Cole Marisola of West Bend West in the finals but avoided a wrestleback and cemented his trip to state when Quick won his third-place match.

Cuadra, who often competes with

Sharp-shooting Giannopoulos helps spark Spartans

Give Ari Giannopoulos an open look from the 3-point line and the end result is often the same.

Nothing but net.

The 6-foot senior is one of Oshkosh North's top perimeter threats and gives the Spartans a third scoring option behind the explosive duo of Steven Clark and Xzavion Mitchell. Twenty-two games into the season, Giannopoulos was averaging 6.8 points per game and was second on the Spartans in 3-pointers made (27), while shooting an impressive 50 percent from beyond the arc.

Sounds like a natural shooter who has been shredding nets since the day he picked up a basketball, right?

Wrong.

Giannopoulos didn't evolve into a sharpshooter overnight. In fact, he struggled so much with his shooting earlier in his hoops career that he had to overhaul the mechanics of his shot.

"Growing up I was never a shooter," he said. "I had the worst shooting form you've ever seen – like a big chicken wing. It was horrible. My brother (Christo) was the shooter. He was the one chucking up and hitting threes.

"There was always competition between us because he's my twin brother. I realized I had to get better at shooting, so I could compete with him. I was shooting the ball above my head and that wasn't right."

Giannopoulos, who had been elevated to the North varsity for the postseason as a freshman, injured his back before his sophomore year and used the downtime wisely. Unable to participate in organized competition while his spine healed, Giannopoulos worked diligently to improve his shooting form and technique. Eventually, the kid with the ugly shot became a 3-point sniper.

"I basically broke my back and was out

six months," he said. "I figured that while I was out, I had time to fix my shot. So I worked on form shooting while I was sitting down and watched a lot of videos on how to shoot.

"I began to better understand the concepts of shooting – how it should feel when it leaves your hand. It took a bit of work, but I got the concepts down in my brain and it all came together. Prior to that, I had never really shot a high volume of threes."

He does now...and North coach Brad Weber likes to see Giannopoulos let it fly.

"Ari is an effective and efficient shooter," Weber said. "He's developed into the type of shooter that every time he shoots, you think it's going in."

Giannopoulos, though, is much more than just a shooter. He averages 1.2 rebounds and 1.5 assists and offers intangibles such as strong communication skills.

"I've appreciated Ari's willingness to use his voice to help our team on the court," Weber said. "His verbal cues during defensive and offensive actions help us become more cohesive as a unit."

As a senior starter on a team powered by the dynamic junior duo of Clark (23.8 ppg) and Mitchell (22.4 ppg), Giannopoulos feels that he's just filling his role.

"Being a senior and one of the guys who has been on the team the longest, I've got to be a leader out there," he said. "I've got to make sure I'm always talking – that I always know what's going on so the person next to me and everyone else knows what's going. That's what coach wants me to do – keep talking out there and be a leader.

"I feel that when I'm open, I can knock down that three. But scoring isn't my main role. It's important to talk out there
