Housing initiatives underway

City developing plan based on 2022 study

City officials have a plan to deal with a housing shortage with a focus on building single-family workforce homes.

According to a 2022 housing study, Oshkosh is facing shortages across all types of

"We still have a long way to go with our housing market and trying to provide units for the people that need them," planning manager Mark Lyons said.

In 2023, 19 single family homes were constructed. Over the last four years 199 single-family homes were built in Oshkosh. At last week's Common Council meeting, Lyons and community development director Kelly Nieforth presented the housing

"New single-family traditional homes are slowing in Oshkosh," Lyons said. "We are seeing less and less new single-family homes being constructed in the city."

Among the challenges facing the city is the older housing stock. There were 745 home sales in Oshkosh in 2023 with the average home being built in 1950. The oldest sold last year was built in 1853.

The city's redevelopment authority (RDA) has been purchasing infill lots that

Xroads41 organizers aspire for major Midwest festival

Improvements in works over previous events

A new music festival coming to Oshkosh this summer could be just the beginning for the group of local owners.

Xroads41 will have 18 acts playing Aug. 8-10. Concert goers will notice some stark changes from other festivals they may have attended at the site.

The festival is owned by Oshkosh Festivals, which is taking over the site formerly known for holding Country USA and Rock USA. Those festivals shut down during the pandemic and there hasn't been a large-scale event at the site

The stage at Xroads41 (pronounced Crossroads 41) will host headliners Brooks & Dunn, Journey and Old Dominion. It is a country leaning lineup but not a country festival, according to organizers. Other acts include Shaggy, Tanya Tucker, Them Dirty Roses and Alana Springsteen.

Bob Bliss and John Gourley, business partners and managers for Xroads41, have more than 90 years of experience with large music festivals.

"We have a reputation throughout this industry," Bliss said. "We know the artists, the managers and the agents to get these top acts here."

Memorial Day events set for May 27 are being organized by the Oshkosh Patriotic Council.

The day begins at 7 a.m. at the South Park Memorial with the Reading of the Names, coordinated by Disabled American Veterans Post 17, where area service members who were killed in action while serving the nation are recognized.

A waterfront ceremony will be held at 8

a.m. by AMVETS Post 7 Auxiliary along the Fox River near the Oshkosh Convention Center. This ceremony will include the laying of a wreath in the water by members of Oshkosh veterans service organizations and commemorates those who lost their lives at sea.

Veterans service organizations, scouting units, military vehicles and law enforcement will line up for the annual procession. The units begin at Jackson Street and go down Algoma Boulevard to Riverside Cemetery for the primary Memorial Day Service. Featured speaker is Chris Kolakowski, director of the Wisconsin Veterans Museum in Madison. At the conclusion of the ceremony will be a 21-gun salute.

the night, the fearful sat waiting for the beginning of the end. Others, however, were less frightful and small crowds gathered near Lake Winnebago to get a good view. There, they were treated to a spectacle of the Northern Lights and the beautiful radiancy of the moon. Some jokingly shook hands with each other as if they never expected to see them again. A few, it was reported, even held house parties to commemorate the historic event.

Local veterans of earlier wars remain honored by groups

Last Man's Club II had tracked Legion members

With the ranks of World War II and Korean War veterans dwindling more than seven decades after those epic conflicts ended, American Legion Cook Fuller Post 70 members continue to stay connected to and memorialize those who served in either.

The Oshkosh post's Last Man's Club II for WWII and Korean War veterans that began with 241 members has fallen below 10, fewer than half of whom have been able to attend the semiannual club meetings at the Delta restaurant. Don Gudmanson took the club reins with the passing of Jack Fuller, a WWII Navy veteran who had helped organize the group along with being caretaker of a special glass collection commemorating its members.

Gudmanson said Last Man's Club II, which followed an earlier alliance of World War I vets, has been retired with a plaque at the Legion club that chaplain Paul Rhyner has updated by Miller Clock Service with the passing of those older veterans.

Robert "Doc" Herman is credited with creating the Last Man's Club II to continue the comradeship enjoyed by the first version of the club. Gudmanson and fellow Korean War veterans Leroy Dahms and Melvin Olson help maintain information on the group that has been turned over to the Post 70 archives.

Gudmanson said the post was very supportive of both Last Man clubs through the years.

"That club is now retired," Gudmanson said. "We just got together on an unofficial (basis) – still had our meetings, still had our memorials for those who were departing."

Gudmanson, a former chaplain and the first prison warden at Oshkosh Correctional Institution when it opened in 1986, said the group has held memorial services since the early 1980s to remember and pray for departed comrades who would join what they call the Post Everlasting.

Gudmanson, who turns 90 in July and was one of five brothers who served during the WWII and Korean War eras, said it was a unique time of unity for the country.

"I think that period that I grew up in, I was so fortunate," he said.

Rhyner said the overall Cook Fuller Post has 12 veterans of World War II remaining and 28 who served during the Korean War.

The overall number of local residents who served in World War II, officially concluded Sept. 2, 1945, with Japan's surrender, has always been difficult to pin down. The Veterans Honor Hall at Oshkosh West High School has the most comprehensive statistics for city natives short of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, which won't release a full list until all have passed away.

Honor Hall founder Andrew Schaller and researcher Gary E. Ross scour school records, yearbooks, obituaries and news articles to track all students from Oshkosh West – the former Oshkosh High School – who have served in the military. Two wooden military seals were put up recently on the new section of the Honor Hall and 164 names added under the new Army section.

Schaller has noted that many WWII veterans who served did not attend high school and are difficult to track without being on school records.

"A large number of Oshkosh soldiers who served in World War II only attended school until sixth or eighth grade and went to work to help support their family." Schaller said.

Other WWII veterans whose Oshkosh connections remain elusive were those that attended private high schools like St. Peter's or didn't return to the area after

their service.

The Honor Hall's research has verified 3,116 from Oshkosh High who served during the war and returned, with another 101 who were killed in action.

They attended the school at some point between 1897 and 1949, mostly between 1937 and 1945. Ross said the oldest was also a World War I veteran and adviser to President Theodore Roosevelt on the Panama Canal project. Some of those in the later years also served during the Korean and Vietnam wars.

An information kiosk added to the hall in 2018 allows them to include extra details beyond name, rank and year such as newspaper clippings, obituaries and photos, which has kept Ross busy backtracking the existing WWII veterans list while confirming the accuracy of the archive.

Ross, a retired firefighter and Air Force veteran from Oshkosh, joined the Honor Hall effort in 2017 and said the stories of those killed in action were especially moving.

The Honor Hall has an ongoing Preservation Project to raise funds through the Oshkosh Area Community Foundation Honor Hall Fund.

Trinity Episcopal Church celebrates past, plans for future

Trinity Episcopal Church parishioners and guests took a big step back in time this month as they commemorated the anniversary of the church's beginning in 1854, with a special service celebrated as it would have been in the mid-19th century.

Some folks even dressed in clothes like those worn during that era.

The Rev. Chris Corbin, Trinity's rector at its downtown location at 203 Algoma Blvd., said the service May 12 – the Sunday closest to the date of Trinity's incorporation on May 11, 1854 – followed the first American Book of Common Prayer from 1789.

"Communion was not celebrated every Sunday in the middle of the 19th century in the Episcopal Church, even though that is the norm now. So, we followed what was the standard service of the time, made up of Morning Prayer, the Great Litany and the part of the communion service that happens before communion," he said. "We also took our scripture readings from the Authorized or King James Version of the Bible."

A reception after the service included

tea, tea cakes, onion and herb bread, and other treats made from recipes of the time. While the clothing worn, food served and manner of worship have changed, Trinity's hallmark dedication to the Oshkosh community remains steadfast.

"Trinity has always been involved in the community. In the late 19th century, for instance, Trinity had missions around town that included work teaching English to German immigrants. The Parish Hall, at its creation, was a center of community life, filling the kind of role that something like the YMCA or for-profit entertainment or recreation venues play today," Corbin explained.

The Parish Hall, next door to the church building at 311 Division St. and housing church offices, is the focus of a recently launched capital campaign: Rooted in Faith, Building to Serve. The first phase of the effort involves adding an elevator and other upgrades to improve accessibility.

"Our hope is to ensure that our facilities continue to be open to the needs of both the church and the community," Corbin said.


cold weather.

Trio Academy expands into day care for young students

When Angela Wade started Trio Academy in 2018, her goal was to provide for children with autism in an area where there were limited resources. The academy continues to grow with a second location and a new day care program.

Trio Academy uses applied behavior analysis (ABA), which is where Wade got her start in the field while in college.

The Trio executive director was studying at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire to become a choir director when she learned about ABA therapy and around the same time met her future husband who has a nephew with autism.

"I love this kid and it was really cool to help and support him," Wade said. She switched majors to psychology and continued to earn her master's in behavioral analysis.

Wade realized she could bring therapy for children with autism and other developmental disabilities to the underserved area after working at a larger agency.

Autism Speaks, an awareness organization, describes ABA as therapy based on the science of learning and behavior. It can help us understand how behavior works and can help with increasing language and communication skills while improving attention, social skills and memory.

Trio Academy at 2850 Universal St. is where it began offering ABA therapy to serve this group of kids, as a private, for-profit school. The group has grown to include Young Scholars and a new day care program.

Explorers is a child care center that opened in November for children that do

not have developmental disabilities.

The Explorers center has seven spots available for children. The day care operates out of Trio Academy East on West Seventh Avenue, which has two therapy rooms for Young Scholars and two day care rooms. It also has separate outdoor

playgrounds and a play space inside for when the weather isn't cooperating.

Young Scholars started two years ago and is designed to serve children with autism and developmental disabilities. Separate from Trio Academy, Young Scholars is a nonprofit private school providing

one-on-one ABA therapy for children in kindergarten through second grade.

One of the special opportunities that Explorers children get is interacting with those in therapy.

"It shows the kids in day care other behaviors, and they can form those unique connections to the other kids while they're in therapy," Wade explained. "Then the kids might say, 'I've seen that before.' The children in therapy can also see how Explorers behave."

That interaction is an experience that benefits all children.

By having the children in ABA therapy interact with the children in day care, it helps them prepare for when they enter the school system, according to Wade. These children will be going from oneon-one instruction to a third-grade classroom with many students, and these small interactions can go a long way to help a child with autism or other developmental issues.

Some parents have asked if Trio will expand the Young Scholars program into third or fourth grade.

"That's not the intention of the program. We offer that one-on-one therapy to get the children ready for school," Wade said.

"Next May we will have our first graduates of Young Scholars and they will then enter the public school system."

Hearing delayed in hit-and-run pedestrian death case

An Oshkosh man accused of striking and killing a pedestrian with his car while delivering pizzas will be back in court next month after his attorneys admitted in court they had not had enough time to go over discovery evidence.

The courtroom was filled with family and friends of Zachary Hagar, who was allegedly struck by Mark P. Radley, who also had supporters in the courtroom. Radley, 69, was charged with hit-and-run involving death in January and plead not guilty to the charges in February.

If convicted, Radley could face up to 15 years in prison followed by a maximum of 10 years of extended supervision.

A pretrial conference was set last week in front of Judge Michael Gibbs but Radley's attorney Timothy Hogan informed Gibbs the defense would need more time to go over evidence before moving forward with the case.

Gibbs granted the defense a month to go over the evidence.

Radley is out on bond, which was initially set by Court Commissioner Eric Heywood at \$50,000 but Hogan argued

due to his family, ties to the community and declining health the bond should be lowered. Gibbs agreed and modified it to a \$5,000 cash bond.

According to the criminal complaint, police were dispatched to the area of Ohio Street and Third Avenue just after 6:30 p.m. Jan. 10. One of the first officers on the scene reported seeing a man in the south-bound lane of Ohio Street with a head injury. When EMS personnel arrived, they attempted lifesaving measures but the man was declared deceased shortly after.

Authorities reviewing surveillance cam-

era footage were able to identify the silver minivan with a license registered to Radley. Officers noted damage to the front and took Radley into custody. He told police he did not drink any alcohol and was not under the influence of drugs.

Police asked Radley about the damage to the van and he acknowledged striking something while driving. When officers asked what happened after he hit the object, Radley responded, "Just kept going, I guess, didn't know what it was."

A new pretrial conference is scheduled for July 15.

There have been several changes not so recognizable at the site on South Washburn Avenue. The entrance has been redone to allow for up to 20 lanes of traffic. Bliss said a traffic coordination company will be brought in to help alleviate some of the congestion issues the former festivals experienced.

"Traffic was one of the top issues we've heard about when speaking to people in the community," Bliss said. "We will have professionals out there which should help with some of that congestion. We will also have a box office off site where people will be able to pick up all of their passes and tickets before getting on the grounds."

This is designed to alleviate other stressors at the front gates and allow for a better experience for festival goers, whether attending for a day or being on the grounds for all three days.

Chet Weisenberg is one of the owners of Oshkosh Festivals along with his father-in-law Tom Rusch and others. Weisenberg said that while traffic can be an issue, the No. 1 concern the community has passed on to the organization is the potential for rain and mud.

Oshkosh Festivals planned the event for August based on 100-year data that shows it to be the dryest month of the summer. They have also installed more than 20 miles of drainage tile on site to help move water away from the concert seating area and campsites.

Bliss said other additions on the site include fiber optic cable for better connectivity and old fencing replaced.

Xroads41 will look similar to previous festivals with the stage in the same place, but organizers are moving where VIPs can watch the musicians.

"Instead of having the VIP area directly in front of the stage and general admission behind them, we are bringing in temporary grandstands to sit on the side of the stage for VIPs to sit in and then general admission ticket holders will be able to get right up in front of the stage," Bliss said

Oshkosh Festivals is working with the community to assure there is local buy-in



but they are doing it with a management team with experience from all over the country, Bliss added.

"The community has been great," Bliss

"This team we've got is second to none," Weisenberg said. "It's top notch from the talent side to the big step up in security. This is all they do and it's been very encouraging throughout the process."

Beyond a stage for live music it will also have an abundance of festival experiences not usually seen such as an art exhibition.

"We're reworking what a festival can look like in this region. I cannot say enough about the elevated experience this will be and it will be a higher quality experience than festivals in the past," Weisenberg said.

The festival has its own ambassador for social media to answer questions people may have while promoting the event. Makenna Mae is the official ambassador for Xroads41.

"You can really tell they put a lot of thought into this," she said.

Mae is the lead singer in the band Grand Union and brings musical and Fox Valley knowledge to the team.

Last week an open house and ribbon-cutting was held out at the grounds at 4125 S. Washburn Ave. Chamber of Commerce president Rob Kleman was in attendance and said he couldn't be happier a multiday festival is coming back to Oshkosh.

"This will become an economic driver for Oshkosh," Kleman said. "This could become a great regional draw in the future and that will create this trickle-down effect for the whole city."

He said the event will add to the summer events held in Oshkosh such as EAA AirVenture and Waterfest, which bring people into the city and benefit commercial businesses like restaurants and hotels.

"This is a great day for Oshkosh," Kleman said. "We're always pushing for more growth. Xroads41 will be an economic advantage and moves the community forward"

According to Bliss, ticket sales have been good with plenty of options still available for all areas and camping sites.

"We don't anticipate selling out in our first year," Bliss said. "But we do plan on building from this and making the next festival even better. It's a new type of festival we're offering and we are very excited for that."

General manager for the festival is Bliss's son-in-law Corey Bliss, who has more than 25 years of experience in the field. He told the Plan Commission in February that Xroads41 has the potential to be the Coachella of the Midwest.

Bob Bliss said Oshkosh Festivals continues to move at a quick pace since work began in February 2023 and plans are for it to be an annual event, with announcement of a second festival for 2025.

Fast-track Lawrence graduate finds path to medical physics

When Grace Weber first stepped foot on the Lawrence University campus, she didn't expect to be graduating in three

Despite her fast-track to the commencement stage – she graduates June 9 – Weber made the most of her time at Lawrence. The physics major from Oshkosh took part in physics research that put a focus on accessibility and set her on a path toward a career in medical physics. She will be attending the University of Minnesota this fall to study medical physics, which Weber said works with coding various pieces of medical equipment, such as linear accelerators, MRI scanners and ultrasounds.

"I want to, in the future, hopefully be a clinical medical physicist where I'd be able to work with cancer patients and create treatment plans," she said.

The Oshkosh West graduate chose to apply her love for physics at Lawrence. Her godmother, Alice Young '92, attended Lawrence and told her about how she valued the community.

Starting in June 2023, she dove into summer research developing an open-source microscope. Her research centered around how to bring research-grade microscopy into the classroom by making it more cost-effective. Components of the microscope were either 3D printed, courtesy of the Lawrence University Makerspace, or created with easily accessible software. The replicability of the microscope makes it ideal for an undergraduate setting.

"Because it is mostly 3D printed, we're able to present it to other schools, and they can make it easily, so that sharing the knowledge is the goal," Weber said.

She and a co-worker, Joseph Carpenter, a junior math and physics double major from Minneapolis, received a grant from the Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium (WSGC) to fund their work on the microscope. It also came with an opportunity to give a presentation at the Wisconsin Space Conference in August.

"Being able to share the research that I had done really helped me prepare for my future and brought me a lot of excitement," Weber said.

For her Senior Experience, Weber worked on making the microscope capable of 3D imaging. By modifying the microscope lenses, she can code it to track a particle in three dimensions.

Thanks to her high school credits and her fall semester study abroad experience in Amsterdam, Weber was able to graduate in three years. Spending a semester abroad - compared to Lawrence's trimester schedule - allowed her to accrue more credits.



'4+1' MPA program merges public, private career goals

The master of public administration (MPA) program at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, established in 1972 for employees in public, nonprofit and health care agencies interested in enhancing their

knowledge and skills, recently joined forces with the undergraduate sociology program to create an innovative, accelerated dual-degree pathway called "4+1."

Now the largest MPA program in Wisoffered consin and completely online, UW Oshkosh's career pathway emphasizes public administration, nonprofit leadership, fire and emergency administration, and management and health agency administration. It includes a network of alums that help pro-



vide job placement opportunities.

It is known as a "4+1" program because students have the opportunity complete a substantial portion of their MPA graduate work while still undergrads, with those credits likewise counting toward their bachelor's degree. This allows them to complete their undergrad and graduate degrees in as little as five years.

It is the only such program in Wiscon-

sin and one of the only in the Midwest.

According to MPA program director Michael Ford, "Our new Sociology to MPA 4+1 program connects public-service minded undergraduates with a longstanding professional degree program. This program will strengthen the talent pipeline of public service profes-

sionals working to improve Wisconsin

communities and their residents."

Paul Van Auken, chair of the UWO Department of Sociology & Public Administration, worked closely with Ford and two other colleagues - Anna Filipova and Juyeon Son – from a department subcommittee to develop the program plan and curriculum, in consultation with the university's registrar Jenny Bonack and Kathy Zuckweiler, dean of graduate studies.

According to Van Auken, it is common for sociology graduates to pursue careers in public service, various educational settings, and health-related fields.

"We're very excited about this partnership," he said. "It's a natural fit, and the 4+1 will create a quicker path to the leadership roles that so many of our alums eventually land in."

Undergraduate sociology majors or minors declare the public administration emphasis within sociology and apply to the 4+1 program during their junior year.

This involves taking multiple MPA courses, such as Introduction to Public Administration and Leadership & Ethics, during their senior year.



are typically smaller or oddly shaped lots, or lots with blighted properties that the city plans to sell to private developers.

As the RDA continues to buy these lots, they are developing an infill lot design book being produced by the Office of Jonathan Tate, an urban and design architecture firm based in New Orleans, and should be completed in late summer.

The design book will have houses for developers to look at to see what types could fit in the variety of infill lots across the city.

There are two projects Nieforth and Lyons are focusing on this year. The first is a public-private partnership with Habitat for Humanity to build workforce housing at the site of Washington Elementary School and the second is a planned subdivision off Farmington Avenue.

Washington Elementary on Winnebago Avenue is shutting its doors at the end of this school year and there is a deal in place for the school district to sell the lot to the

city for \$75,000. The parcel will be divided into 18 lots and be a mix of private developer houses and Habitat homes.

Workforce housing is defined by the city as being for residents that earn between 80% and 120% of area median income. For Winnebago County, the area median income is \$94,600, meaning workforce housing households have an income between \$75,680 and \$113,500.

On Farmington Avenue, the road is set to be extended east and the area divided into 19 lots ranging from just under 6,000 square feet to just under 16,000 square feet, with most lots being around 9,000 square feet, according to preliminary plans.

The two projects have the potential to create 37 new single-family homes.

Lyons said there are several multifamily developments that have been approved for which construction has not started, including the 295 units in the Mill on Main project on South Main Street.

Since 2020, the Common Council has approved 1,611 multifamily residential units with only 179 being completed, 350 units under construction and 1,082 from projects that have not been started.

The market banned the use of Styrofoam for retail sales starting last year to reduce the market's carbon footprint on the community. Free market shopping bags will be provided by sponsoring local companies.

Feeding America and the UW Extension will be providing on-site SNAP benefit distribution and matching at the Oshkosh Area Food Pantry for use at the farmers market.







"I thought this might have been one of Colton's best pitching performances," Loeper said. "West did a nice job battling but he fought through and gave us five real strong innings."


The Wildcats got a strong start from Avery Mosloski, who allowed just three hits over five innings and struck out two.



Lourdes Academy's Proud leaves legacy on diamond



Reagon Proud is likely to be a four-time first-team all-Trailways Conference selection and one of the most decorated softball players in Lourdes Academy history.

Keeping Reagon Proud off the basepaths has been a Herculean task for opposing pitchers.

Keeping her out of the record books has been even tougher.

The skilled, speedy senior shortstop will close her decorated high school sports career as one of the most impactful players in Lourdes Academy girls' softball program history.

Proud is the program's all-time leader in stolen bases (73) heading into this week's regional semifinal tournament action and she holds the school record for most steals in a single season (29 in 2022). But it takes hits to get on base and swipe bags. Few Knights' players have been more productive at the plate than Proud, who is second in school history in base hits with 133 behind only Lauren Schiek.

Proud is also second on Lourdes' alltime home run list (nine) behind all-time leader Chloe Evans. Both Schiek and Evans became Division 1 college softball

"I've been fortunate to have coached Reagon, Lauren (Schiek) and Chloe (Evans)," said Lourdes coach Jim Johnson. "All three were amazing talents and fantastic people."

Proud landed a spot on the 2023 Wisconsin Fastpitch Coaches Association Team for Divisions 4 and 5 and was an all-district selection. She is expected to land first-team all-conference honors in 2024 for the fourth consecutive year.

"Reagon is a fun player to watch," said Johnson. "She is a dynamic, high-energy player who gives you every last drop she

has to give."

Proud has given Lourdes a consistent spark the past four years. A right-handed hitter with exceptional speed and good power, Proud entered this week with a .488 batting average, 10 RBI and nine stolen bases. As a junior, Proud hit a prolific .559 with five home runs, 25 RBI and 16 stolen bases. Proud had a .554 batting average as a sophomore with three homers, 25 RBI and 29 stolen bases after launching her prep career with a .590 batting average, a homer, 15 RBI and 19 stolen bases her freshman year.

A team captain, Proud has played through injuries countless times.

"Reagon plays fast and plays hard," Johnson said. "More than once she has dislocated fingers or a shoulder, but she has never left the game.

"Reagon is very driven and has a strong desire to excel and achieve. These traits will serve her well in anything she decides to pursue."

Proud takes pride in what she has accomplished on the diamond.

"I've been playing softball my whole life and it's really cool to be recognized for some of these things," she said.

Despite the extra-base punch she has shown at the plate, Proud considers herself to be a contact hitter. And once she's on base, Proud knows how to pressure a defense.

"I'm more of a line-drive hitter than power hitter and I know how to use my speed," Proud said. "When I'm on base, I
