Municipal funding cut from state budget

Oshkosh taxpayers will continue financing state-owned buildings that are exempt from property taxes.

The Joint Finance Committee (JFC) in Madison voted last week to take \$17 million out of the 2025-27 biennial budget that would have increased funding to the Municipal Services Payment (MSP) program.

Gov. Tony Evers proposed increasing funding for the program to help local municipalities that end up having to pay for state-owned properties across Wisconsin.

When the program was created in 1981, it was funded at 100%.

Since then, funding has decreased significantly to around 36% of the full funds. Evers proposed increasing that to 72%.

With 36% of the MSP funded, Oshkosh received around \$1 million last year to cover the costs of state-owned buildings that don't pay taxes but utilize city services such as police, fire and

garbage collection.

If the program was funded at 100%, that would mean \$2.7 million for the city to fund services and not cover the state buildings. If the 72% proposal stayed in the governor's budget, it would have doubled Oshkosh's funding to around \$2 million.

Oshkosh ranks third in Wisconsin for state-owned buildings behind Milwaukee and Madison. The buildings in Oshkosh include UW-Oshkosh, Oshkosh Correctional Institute and the Wisconsin Re-

Changes could be coming to the hours for Saturday buses

Passengers using public transit in Oshkosh could see a change to Saturday service as the city deals with losing drivers and the need to reduce costs as it enters its budget season.

Transportation director Jim Collins explained four options for the transportation committee to consider as GO Transit continues to have issues, including recruiting and retaining drivers.

The city is also looking at constraints

with the 2026 budget, so the transportation department might be asked to make some cuts. Those appear to be aimed at Saturday service.

"With the budget, it's going to be a challenge this year," Collins said.

The Oshkosh Common Council voted last year to use approximately \$3.6 million from the general fund to cover costs and avoid a large hike for taxpayers. It's a move that former city manager Mark Rohloff said could be disastrous for the 2026 budget.

The four options Collins presented to

the committee include keeping service hours the same, eliminating Saturday service, reducing Saturday hours or adjusting Saturday hours and offering a micro transit option similar to a rideshare service.

Ridership drops after 2 p.m. every day. According to 2024 data, on weekdays GO Transit averaged 72,340 rides across the year before 2 p.m. compared to just 43,512 rides averaged after 2 p.m. during the week. On Saturdays there was a reported 45,103 rides before 2 p.m. and 25,460 after 2 p.m.

Data from GO Transit shows that ridership drops on Saturday across all nine bus routes.

GO Transit is owned and operated by the city, with 61% of the operating budget coming from federal and state grants. The remaining budget is covered by fares and local tax dollars from the city and county. It currently operates nine routes across Oshkosh six days a week from 6:15 a.m. to 6:45 p.m.

A Toppling Hunger Cereal Drive is underway through Monday in an effort to support children and families facing food insecurity across Northeast Wisconsin.


All 22 Fox Communities Credit Union locations are serving as drop-off sites for donations of unexpired, healthy cereal. Low sugar, whole grain items are preferred.

June 27, 1953

Thousands Jam Streets of Centennial Event: The greatest celebration in Oshkosh's 100-year history kicks off a nine-day centennial celebration with a parade at 2 p.m. The week plus long occasion will include music, dances, programs, a carnival, boat races, live band performances, and much, much more. Bells, whistles, and serial bombs will ring in the official opening at noon at which time all Oshkosh business establishments will close for a local holiday. Miss Carol Genal will be crowned Oshkosh Centennial Queen by Wisconsin Governor Walter J. Kohler. Letters of congratulations have been received here from both President Dwight D. Eisenhower and General Douglas McArthur.

District makes principal hiring recommendations

The Oshkosh Area School District has made principal hiring recommendations for Jefferson Elementary School and South Park Middle School.

The hirings of Taneisha Jones for Jefferson and Martin O'Donnell for South Park will be presented to the Board of Education for approval at its meeting today.

Jones currently serves as the principal fellow at Dr. Howard Fuller Collegiate Academy in Milwaukee. Her background also includes roles as a rising principal, assistant principal and instructional coach at Milwaukee Excellence Charter School, a dean of students at Nathan Hale High School and a curricular coordinator, middle school social studies teacher and fifth-grade teacher at Darrell

Lynn Hines Academy.

Pending board approval, Jones will begin her new role as Jefferson's principal on July 7. Jones would replace Amy Ashton, who resigned after one year in her role at Jefferson.



O'Donnell

O'Donnell currently serves as the associate principal at Washington Middle School in Manitowoc. Before that, he dedicated 12 years as a band teacher at J.R. Gerritts Middle School in Kimberly, and he also taught at Weyauwega-Fremont Middle and High School.

Pending board approval, O'Donnell will begin his new role as South Park's principal on July 1. O'Donnell would replace Joe Pitsch, who had been at South Park for four years.

FVTC approves new transfer agreements

Fox Valley Technical College (FVTC) has partnered with the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee (UWM) and the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point (UWSP) for University Transfer Degree (UTD) agreements with both universities.

These partnerships create opportunities for students to complete their first two years of general education classes at FVTC, earn an associate of arts or an associate of science degree and transfer credits

to UWM or UWSP to pursue a bachelor's degree with junior standing. Additionally, UWM's transfer agreement includes the acceptance of at least 60 credits from graduates of FVTC's Associate of Applied Science degree programs.

At UW-Milwaukee, all FVTC associate degree holders from any graduation year will be guaranteed admission and transfer of at least 60 credits. This means they could start at UWM already halfway toward many bachelor's degrees.

Fireworks continue to cause concerns in Oshkosh

As Independence Day nears, many area residents will be gearing up for cookouts, family gatherings or maybe a day on the water. Fireworks displays are often a part of the celebrations, but a new city ordinance fine structure is designed to curb illegal fireworks across Oshkosh.

The Common Council updated the fireworks policy last year after complaints about fireworks being set off at all hours of the day. Some advised that people were setting off illegal fireworks near the downtown area.

Oshkosh police released a list of fireworks that are illegal to set off within city limits, which includes roman candles, firecrackers, bottle rockets, mortars and anything that explodes or leaves the ground.

Legal fireworks in city limits include sparklers, stationary cones, toy snakes, caps, noise makers and confetti poppers with less than half a grain of explosive.

The council last year approved a new escalating fine structure for people setting off illegal fireworks in the City of Oshkosh. The fines are different for juveniles and adults with offenses tracked over 36 months.

For juveniles, the first offense is a \$100 fine, second offense is a \$150 fine and the third offense within 36 months is a \$500 fine. For adults, the first offense is \$125, second offense is \$225 and the third offense within 36 months is \$1,000.

Each of the juvenile offenses come with \$5 in court costs added to the fine. For

adults, the court costs escalate with each offense, going from \$170 for court costs on first offense to \$397.50 for third offense.

This means that an adult who has been convicted of three offenses in 36 months would pay \$1,397.50 just for the third offense. The total fine for all three offenses for an adult, if convicted, is \$2,113.50.

"Fireworks may be enjoyable, but they can also cause distress to many in our community, especially those with PTSD or noise sensitivities. Loud explosions can also have a negative impact on pets, causing them undue stress and potential harm," Oshkosh police public affairs officer Kate Mann said.

Oshkosh Fire Department Chief Tim Heiman explained that although fireworks are entertaining, they can also cause serious injury. A report from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission stated an estimated 15,600 people were treated in emergency departments for fireworks injuries in 2020.

Heiman provided some safety tips for people as they celebrate Independence

Day. He said to never let children play with or ignite fireworks and always supervise children even when using sparklers.

Other tips include:

- Avoid purchasing professional display fireworks packaged in brown paper.
- Light fireworks one at a time.
- Don't place any part of your body directly over a fireworks display.
- Keep a bucket of water, garden hose or fire extinguisher nearby.
- Never shoot fireworks off in metal or glass containers.
- Don't try to re-light fireworks that haven't fully ignited.
- Wear hearing protection.
- Never use fireworks while impaired by alcohol or drugs.

Council member Kris Larson shared a video on social media last week of people lighting off fireworks in downtown in a densely populated neighborhood on Jefferson Street near the intersection of Merritt Avenue.

"It was very loud. It was very scary, and it scared my dogs," Larson said. "It's very off-putting in (downtown) where it happens every night."

Larson, who owns Wagner's Market and lives in the area, posted a video of the incident on social media. It shows what appears to be three people lighting fireworks in the middle of Jefferson Street and then watching it explode in the Wagner's parking lot.

The video ends with the three individuals running towards North Main Street. This, Larson said, highlights how people can avoid enforcement by fleeing the area.

"It's difficult to enforce because the fireworks get lit, they explode and they have time to leave before the police show up. That's why the council put in the fine structure," Larson said.

Larson commented that he has noticed that even though fireworks are still going off in downtown from May to September, there does seem to be fewer explosions than last year.

"It's certainly less than last year," he said.

Fireworks over Fisk set to launch

The Fireworks over Fisk show is set to launch at dusk July 3 in downtown Fisk.

This will mark the 51st anniversary of the display and second year under new management. Organizers said the fireworks are 100% funded by donations made by sponsors, local businesses and spectators.

The launch site will be located south of Wisconsin Highway 44, about 1/8 mile from Fisk. According to organizers, viewing and parking will remain the same as in previous years at the Utica fire station, 1730 County Road FF, and surrounding side roads.

The special feature is the 50 shell salute to the 50 states opener.

Road project underway

A resurfacing project is underway on Wisconsin Highway 91 near Oshkosh to improve the smoothness of the road, extend the pavement life and increase safety, according to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. Highway 91 will be closed and detoured during the beginning of the project but will be open for a week in July during EAA AirVenture. Project completion is anticipated in October.

County board seeks applicants for vacancy



County to open most highways to ATVs, UTVs

Ordinance expands off-road vehicle routes

All-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and utility-terrain vehicles (UTVs) will soon be allowed on most county highways in Winnebago County, following the County Board's June 17 vote to amend its ordinance.

The county first passed an ATV/UTV ordinance in 2019, allowing limited use on select roads with low traffic volumes and accident histories, and only during daylight hours. The updated ordinance now expands access to most county highways and permits ATV and UTV operation at any time unless otherwise posted.

Under state law, local governments determine where these vehicles can operate. Some municipalities within the county have also designated local roads as approved routes.

The decision to open county highways to recreational vehicles comes after months of coordination with the Winnebago County Sheriff's Department, Highway Committee and ATV/UTV Alliance.

Supporters of the change say it provides safer, legal routes for ATV and UTV riders while promoting recreational tourism and local businesses, connecting existing trails and improving county-wide connectivity.

David Schmidt of Oshkosh, chairman of Winnebago County ATV/UTV Alliance and president of Fox River Wheelers, told the board that there are more than 512,000 registered recreational vehicles in Wisconsin.

"Winnebago County ranks fourteenth in registered machines and the way the routes are currently open, it's kind of limiting for what we're able to do," he said. "So we urge a vote to go ahead and approve this and move it along so we can get everybody out on the road riding safely and enjoying their rides."

Sheriff John Matz, who in 2019 spoke out against the initial ordinance opening county roadways to ATVs and UTVs, said he is now in support of expanding it to allow highway usage because the surrounding counties have changed their ordinances, leaving Winnebago County ATV and UTV users "on an island."

"Also, we have not seen any type of uptick in crashes related to ATV/UTV use

following the current ordinance that we have," he said.

To drive on county roads, ATV and UTV riders must be 16 years old, have a valid license and insurance. The vehicles are not required to have turn signals, but must have head, tail and brake lights, and operators are legally required to use hand signals.

Both the city and town of Neenah expressed opposition to the ordinance, according to statements made by supervisors at the meeting. City and town roads fall under their own ordinances for whether they allow ATVs and UTVs to operate on roadways.

Several supervisors who opposed the amendments raised concerns about safety, including the potential for crashes or fatalities.

"If somebody got killed, I wouldn't want that on my conscience," Supervisor Don Nussbaum said during public comment via Zoom. He was absent from the meeting and did not vote, but said he would have voted against the amendments.

Some questioned how riders would know which county roads are off-limits, since the list of prohibited highways is not formally adopted into the ordinance.

"My concern is, it's not clear to me how the jurisdiction is determined, which roads have the traffic to warrant limitation, which roads don't, it just doesn't feel clear to me, and with that I'll be voting no on this amendment because it's just not clear," Supervisor Stefanie Holt said.

Lt. Darin Rice said the Sheriff's Office worked with the ATV/UTV Alliance to identify county highways that would be closed to ATV and UTV traffic. The list still needs to be discussed at an upcoming Highway Committee meeting. Roads expected to be off-limits include County Highways BB, CB, P, AP, JJ, O, II east of State 76, M between State 116 and Lasley Point Road, and most of Highway A, except the section between Highway G and Indian Point Road.

The ATV/UTV Alliance will be working with the Highway Department to post signage throughout the county that will indicate which highways are not open to ATV/UTV traffic.

The County Board approved the ordinance amendments by a 26-5 vote. However, the current rules remain in place until the updated ordinance is officially published and new signage is installed.

George Washington bust set to move to new location

Piece part of larger historical Hicks collection

A bust of the United States' first president is looking for a new home in Oshkosh.

George Washington's bust was formerly displayed at Washington Elementary School on Winnebago Avenue. The school has since been demolished, and the land was sold to build single-family homes in the neighborhood.

According to state statute, it is the city's Plan Commission's job to review moving any statues or memorials. The commission has recommended moving the bust to Roe Park on Washington Avenue.

Roe Park is situated between the downtown YMCA to the east, and the Winnebago County Human Services building and Oshkosh Public Library to the west. The park has walking paths and a playground.

A meeting was held with city staff and representatives from several neighborhood associations, who voted to recommend moving the Washington statue to Roe Park on the Washington Avenue side.

Col. John Hicks donated the bust to the city in the early 1900s as part of a collection. Hicks was the owner and publisher of the Oshkosh Daily Northwestern in the late 1800s and later served as the minister to Peru and then ambassador to Chile.

Pilot program helps families with housing needs

Organizers of a pilot initiative launched in 2024 said it has helped over 100 families in Winnebago County avoid homelessness.

Local nonprofits have worked with philanthropic partners as part of the Winnebago County Emergency Assistance Collaborative. The program, led by the J.J. Keller Foundation in partnership with the Oshkosh Area Community Foundation, Basic Needs Giving Partnership and frontline agencies, was designed to deliver fast, flexible emergency financial aid to families at risk of eviction.

"This isn't just about emergency funding — it's about creating a no wrong door approach," said Sara Brown, program supervisor for Winnebago County's HELP Program. "Families don't hear 'we can't help.' Instead, they're met with coordination, compassion and a clear path forward."

The Collaborative brought together six agencies — Winnebago County HELP

The Hicks collection is a set of 11 busts and statues ranging from the Chief Oshkosh monument in Menominee Park to the Abraham Lincoln bust at the Oshkosh Public Museum to the Civil War Soldier's Monument in Opera House Square, which Hicks erected in 1907, dedicating it to the "Wisconsin men who fought in the

program (Homeless, Eviction and Loss Prevention), LEAVEN, Advocap, Casa Esther, Community Benefit Tree and the Salvation Army of Oshkosh — to pool resources and make joint decisions. Weekly meetings allowed staff to review cases and respond immediately to housing crises, using a shared emergency fund.

From July 2024 to February 2025, organizers said the collaborative has assisted 103 households, averaging 15 per month; prevented eviction for 63 families; helped 30 households with security deposits or first month's rent; provided six families with temporary hotel stays and addressed urgent needs (e.g., water bills, pest control, car repairs) for four households.

The initiative was launched with seed funding from the J. J. Keller Foundation, followed by support from the Oshkosh Area Community Foundation and the Basic Needs Giving Partnership. Together, they contributed \$85,000, with \$83,600 going directly to households in need. The United Way of Oshkosh served as the fiscal agent.

war for the Union."

Pieces of the Hicks collection are located all around Oshkosh. A number of busts are at schools named in honor of America's Founding Fathers such as Jefferson Elementary with a bust of Thomas Jefferson and a bust of Benjamin Franklin at Franklin Elementary.

Hicks also acquired the lions that stand in front of the Oshkosh Public Library.

Other pieces from the Hicks collection that can be found in Oshkosh include a life-size George Washington statue at the corner of New York Avenue and Hazel Street, a bust of poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, writer of "Paul Revere's Ride," inside the Oshkosh Public Library and the Hiker monument, honoring soldiers from the Spanish-American War, at the intersection of Algoma Boulevard and Congress Avenue.

"Oshkosh is lucky to have such a wonderful collection of fine public art statues," said Emily Rock, who is the assistant director and chief curator of the Oshkosh Public Museum.

"(Hicks) gifted busts and full-size statues of historical figures to the City of Osh-

kosh to beautify the city," Rock said. "In a forward-thinking move, he also left a fund of money for the long-term care of these statues, specifying that the Oshkosh Public Library manage that fund. This ensured their preservation for future generations."

Rock explained Hicks was inspired by an attraction at the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago. The attraction inspired numerous cities to create more attractive urban landscapes by replicating features found in European cities.

"This was done by adding public statues, neoclassical architecture and creating public parks. Residents were proud of these fine statues gifted by Col. Hicks and held public unveiling ceremonies," Rock said. "The fact that these statues have lasted more than one hundred years and are so loved by Oshkosh residents shows how much the community values public art and history."

The details regarding where the Washington bust will be placed, how it will be maintained and other specifics will be approved at a later date. The Plan Commission voted 8-0 to move the Washington bust to Roe Park.

State lawmakers express support for striking workers

A group of 34 Democratic state lawmakers signed a letter last week sent to Cummins Corporation in support of striking union workers.

State Rep. Lori Palmeri said the letter dated June 17 expresses the lawmakers' support for UAW Local 291 members in their ongoing efforts to negotiate a new contract with the company. More than 90 workers at the Cummins plant in Oshkosh have been on strike since March 18 after union officials rejected the company's contact proposal.

Since then, union members have voted against contract proposals from Cummins officials as the sides have been unable to reach an agreement. The Indianapolis-based company makes components for military

and heavy construction equipment.

The lawmakers said they are specifically "advocating for the workers' concerns when it comes to working on an expired contract, temporary worker language within the contract, and mandatory Saturdays."

"As legislators, it is our duty to stand up for our constituents and support them in their endeavors for fair and just working conditions," the legislators wrote in the letter. "Many of us were proud to join Local 291 at their strike line these past few months, helping in their fight for these ideals. We strongly encourage Cummins to meet with UAW 291 sooner, rather than later."

State Sen. Kristin Dassler Alfheim and State Rep. Lee Snodgrass were other area lawmakers who signed the letter.

A recent cyberattack on a national food distributor has affected the process to order food for grocery stores across the country, including one locally.

Two weeks ago, the Oshkosh Food Co-op received notice from United Natural Foods Inc. (UNFI) that the company's operations were being affected. Co-op store manger Jeremiah McDuffie did not disclose what the notice said, but he confirmed the co-op was having issues placing orders earlier this month.

The co-op receives two orders a week and had to find another supplier to meet the demand, McDuffie said.

"There was disruption during that week," he said. "We were able to find what we needed."

McDuffie told the Herald the co-op staff did a great job handling the changes and setbacks caused from the UNFI cyberattack.

"Everybody came together to be able to continue serving the community," he said.

Although the supply issues aren't fully resolved nationally, McDuffie said the co-op hasn't experienced any further setbacks as a result of the situation, and its operations have been back on track since then.

UNFI serves approximately 30,000 store locations and around 11,000 suppliers. The company has distribution centers across the country with centers in Stevens

Point and Green Bay, according to the company website.

The company filed a report with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) on June 9 stating UNFI became aware of "unauthorized activity on certain of its Information Technology systems."

It continued, "The Company promptly activated its incident response plan and implemented containment measures, including proactively taking certain systems offline, which has temporarily impacted the Company's ability to fulfill and distribute customer orders."

"The incident has caused, and is expected to continue to cause, temporary disruptions to the Company's business operations. The Company is working actively to assess, mitigate, and remediate the incident with the assistance of third-party cybersecurity professionals and has notified law enforcement."

UNFI supplies to major grocery chains like Whole Foods. Multiple news reports suggested these bigger stores had empty shelves as it became difficult to find the necessary products.

A major reason why the Oshkosh Food Co-op's customers did not notice empty sections at the store was due to a reliance on locally sourced items, McDuffie said. Approximately 30% of the store is locally sourced, he said.

"It's important for us to help sustain that local economy," McDuffie said. "We've continued building those relationships in Oshkosh, the Fox Valley and Wisconsin."

Network outage impacts insurance customers

Erie Insurance has been reaching out to customers regarding an ongoing network outage and information security incident response.

During the outage, which was first reported on June 8, the company said it will not contact customers by phone or email to request payments. It said to not click on any links from unknown sources or share personal information by phone or email.

"Our teams — partnering with leading cybersecurity experts — continue working around the clock to restore access for customers, agents and employees," Erie said in a June 17 update. "Unfortunately, incidents like this are becoming increasingly sophisticated and can impact even the most well-protected organizations. Upon detecting unauthorized activity, we took immediate action to contain the issue and have since implemented additional security measures to further strengthen our systems."

In the June 17 update, the company said it had control of its systems. It has seen no evidence of ransomware and there is no indication of an ongoing threat.

"We take these matters very seriously and are committed to providing updates as appropriate," the company said. "We encourage customers to follow best practices around personal security and notify their financial institutions of any unusual activity."

Erie representatives have advised customers the only trustworthy correspondence they will receive will be delivered by the United States Postal Service.

While the protective actions the company initiated are ongoing, it said local agents, claims and customer care teams continue to support customers. Policyholders who need to initiate a claim can contact their local agent or ERIE's First Notice of Loss team at 800-367-3743. Customer Care is also available at 800-458-0811.

source Center.

Evers told the Herald in May that he decided not to ask for the program to be funded at 100% because he felt it was too much of an ask for the Republican-controlled legislature. The JFC is the first group to go over the budget and make initial changes and is made up of 16 legislators, including 12 Republicans and 4 Democrats.

"It's a step in the right direction," Evers said last month during an event in Oshkosh.

Common Council member Kris Larson expressed frustration on social media regarding the increase being taken out of Evers' budget.

Larson stated on social media. "This is par for whatever course we are on, however your council had higher hopes than usual when we drafted formal resolution on this subject specifically asking for this provision to remain," Larson stated on social media.

Other council members also voiced concerns about the state buildings being funded by Oshkosh.

"Here's the truth: cities can't print money. We pave the roads, staff the fire departments, and protect public safety. We do the work — and when the state fails to do its part, we're left with impossible choices: raise local taxes or cut essential services," Council Member DJ Nichols said in a statement to the Herald. "That's not partnership. That's neglect."

Oshkosh City Manager Rebecca Grill said the city is entering the budget season for 2026 and is starting with a \$3 million deficit. This is the result of the Common Council voting to move about \$3.5 million from the general fund.

"The Wisconsin Legislature's Joint Finance Committee's choice to not add more funds to the Municipal Services Payment Program exacerbates this problem," Grill said. "The program's funding remains around 37%, with the city getting reimbursed a little more than \$1 million. This means Oshkosh taxpayers are covering the \$1.7 million gap and will necessitate further service adjustments in our 2026 budget."

Nichols concluded his statement with, "When the state refuses to invest in our cities, we all pay the price."

Collins explained to the transportation committee that the city is losing drivers due to quality of life issues. Oshkosh bus drivers work 12-hour shifts compared to other positions in the city, like those in the sanitation division, which work what is considered a more preferable 8-hour shift.

The city will often lose drivers to Appleton and Fond du Lac, Collins said.

"There's a small pool of candidates for that type of position," Collins said. "We have issues recruiting and retaining those drivers."

Appleton's Valley Transit has recently

changed its hours, no longer operating the fixed-route buses on Saturday afternoons and instead instituting a micro-transit service.

Micro-transit is similar to ride-share

services, like Uber and Lyft, a shared program that works like a cab company. People would schedule or order a ride when the buses aren't running.

Municipalities using the micro transit system have set hours and do not operate 24/7 like those private rideshare apps.

During the transportation committee meeting, Collins provided data on ridership that indicated after 2 p.m. on Saturday ridership does drop off.

Council member DJ Nichols serves on the transportation committee and asked if there was a survey done to see where people are going on Saturday afternoons. Nichols said if these people are going to work, it's important they have reliable transportation.

There is a program within GO Transit — Access to Jobs (ATJ) that is a cab ride

service with the purpose of going to and from work only. The program is designed to serve low-income individuals with full-time jobs when the bus is not in service.

Other public transit providers in the area have a mix of Saturday services. Collins provided this information to shed light on how public transit operates on Saturday in the region.

Fond du Lac Transit is closed on Saturdays, while Green Bay Metro, Shoreline Metro and Valley Transit operate limited hours on Saturday and offer micro transit service.

Collins also provided three reasons why the change needed to be made and those include driver retention, the need for more supervisors and it would be a pivotal cost-saving measure.

The committee discussed other options starting with having a survey for Saturday riders and also considered eliminating certain routes on Saturday or having Saturday-only routes.

The committee made no decision during its June 10 meeting, but Collins and GO Transit staff will continue looking at options as the department prepares for budget workshops in October.

Any decision to change the GO Transit service hours would need to be voted on and recommended by the transportation committee and then approved by the council.




Photo Collage




