Sheriff shares county-wide ICE stats

Recent data from the Winnebago County Sheriff's Office shows the department is working with the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agency following an agreement between the departments.

The agreement between the county and ICE primarily allows the sheriff's office to detain individuals for up to 48 hours as they wait for ICE to pick them up. The 287(g) agreement was signed in March by Winnebago County Sheriff John Matz and former acting director of ICE Caleb

Vitello.

This year, between Jan. 1 and July 18, the sheriff's office reported 2,105 total bookings into the Winnebago County Jail, 126 of them were born outside of the United States. ICE was notified about 88 individuals. A detainer was placed on eight individuals, six of whom were turned over to ICE, and the other two were transferred to another agency.

Matz on Aug. 4 addressed during a Judiciary and Public Safety committee meeting when and why the county notifies ICE. The person has to have committed a jailable offense, he said. This does not include some-

thing like a broken taillight during a traffic stop, but it would include crimes like battery or a second drunk driving offense.

When the person is being booked into Winnebago County Jail, Matz said jail staff will notify ICE about the person under two circumstances. The first is if the individual cannot be matched to a person in the system and the other is if the person is in the country illegally.

Matz said this includes individuals under removal proceedings or someone who has been previously removed from the

Main Street bridge to close until April for improvements

Oshkosh's Main Street bridge will close after Labor Day and stay closed for construction until next spring.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation announced last week that the Main Street bridge will close on Sept. 2 and is expected to reopen in April.

The \$6 million contract was signed by Gov. Tony Evers for what he called an investment into Oshkosh and Wisconsin's transportation system.

WisDOT explained the bridge is safe for

vehicle and pedestrian crossings, but the bridge does need routine maintenance.

"The purpose of the project is to preserve the operation of the structural, mechanical, and electrical components of the US 45 Main Street Bridge," WisDOT stated. "The existing structure and its mechanical and electrical elements have received various repairs and maintenance over its lifespan, but the structure has become deficient due to varying levels of deterioration. Many of the elements are deteriorated or have exhausted their useful service life. These include structural, mechanical, hydraulic,

and electrical components."

Improvements include:

- Rehabilitate existing electrical, mechanical, hydraulic and structural components of the bascule span.
- Minor repairs to the operator's house, hydraulic power units and access platforms.
- Concrete deck repairs and overlay of the fixed approach spans.
- Removal and replacement of the steel grid deck on the movable span.

The official detour designated for vehicles by WisDOT is to use Ninth Avenue, Oregon Street and Jackson Street. The pe-

destrian detour is laid out for people to use Sixth Avenue, Oregon and Jackson Street and Pearl Avenue to get to Main Street.

Along with trucks and passenger vehicles that cross the bridge every day, it is used by first responders, primarily the Oshkosh Fire Department.

OFD's Station 15, 101 Court St., is less than 1,000 feet from the bridge. OFD fire engines and ambulances will often receive a call and head down Ceape Avenue and onto Main Street, then across the bridge

Aug 18, 1882

Circus Comes to Town: W.W. Cole's circus made its advent into our fair city this morning and gave its street parade promptly in the forenoon. The parade

featured a team of eight fine camels drawing a band wagon while four elephants in harness hailed a huge car. Some very handsome horses marched on followed by a mammoth elephant carrying a load of boys on its back. A calliope and automaton added to the festivities along with a man in a cage of loose lions and a snake charmer with snakes winding around him. Attendance at the afternoon performance was quite large.

Oshkosh Library to hold Million Minute Reader Party

Oshkosh Public Library invites readers to celebrate reaching a community goal to read one million minutes this summer.

The Million Minute Reader Party will be from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Aug. 22 in the library's first floor Reading Room. All ages are welcome to enjoy ice cream treats (while supplies last), play games, make crafts and celebrate this accomplishment with other readers.

Oshkosh readers surpassed the million-minute goal well ahead of schedule this summer, and they're still going as the summer reading program nears its final chapter.

To date, participants have logged more than 1.4 million minutes of reading in the program, which runs through Saturday.

"The community really embraced the challenge of meeting the million-minute goal," Library Director Darryl Eschete said. "Setting a goal created a shared experience that brought us together around reading and made the library a special part of their summer."

There are benefits to cultivating a reading habit that extend beyond that sense of achievement.

For children, reading daily helps them to maintain their reading skills and return to school in the fall ready to learn. And reading regularly can reduce stress, foster empathy and help to broaden perspectives at any age.

More than 1,600 people participated in the library's summer reading program. In addition to reading, they also made 189 donations to local food pantries and submitted 411 book reviews to earn prizes

Sheriff's office mourns passing of retired K9

The Winnebago County Sheriff's Office and the community are mourning the passing of retired K9 Tim who served in the department for more than 10 years before retiring in spring 2024.

The sheriff's office announced Tim's passing last week on social media. The Facebook post received over 1,200 reactions, including over 100 comments sharing condolences to the sheriff's office and thanking Tim for his service.

K9 Tim, a German Shepherd, was a dual-purpose K9 unit, meaning he was trained in narcotics detection and apprehension. He was also trained in tracking, building searches, area searches and handler protection.

K9 Tim was 2 1/2 years old when he came to the sheriff's office in 2013. He began working with deputy Clint Czerwinski before he was reassigned to work with his handler of over 10 years, Lt. Kyle Schoonover.

Schoonover told the Herald K9 Tim was a great dog and a great partner. He added working with Tim was an honor, a blessing and definitely a career highlight.

"Tim was intense and fearless, a true alpha dog. He loved to work," he said. "He would get excited and start barking the second he heard me unbuckle my seatbelt or key up the mic, knowing he might get the chance to work."

K9 Tim never hesitated to put his own life on the line to protect Schoonover.

The sheriff's office said Tim eventually became the unofficial big brother to the newer K9s in the department by showing them the ropes and how to act when

working as a K9.

Schoonover and K9 Tim would often do demonstrations in schools and at countless public events. Schoonover loved those moments, especially the smiles it brought to children's faces.

"The last demo we did before he retired was at my kids' school; it's a memory I'll cherish forever," he said.

The sheriff's office currently has three dual-purpose K9s, one K9 specializing in explosives and a therapy K9.

"As with all of our K9's we are appreciative of their commitment to protecting our deputies and the citizens we serve. Regardless of the weather conditions, how much rest they've had or any other external factors they are always excited to work," Sheriff John Matz said.

In March 2024 the sheriff's office announced that after over 10 years of service Tim retired at home with the Schoonover family. In retirement, Tim thrived.

"He loved being outside with our kids," Schoonover recalled. "He was deeply loved by our family. He will be greatly missed and we will honor him forever."

Suspect arrested in weekend shooting

The Oshkosh Police Department is investigating a shooting over the weekend.

Police reported officers were dispatched to the area of Central Street and West Irving Avenue around 1:50 p.m. Saturday after receiving reports of gunshots.

A 20-year-old male was located in the area with a gunshot wound. He was taken to a local hospital and treated for non-life threatening injuries.

Officers determined the shooting occurred in the 600 block of Franklin Street, which is about two blocks from where the victim was located.

This is the second shooting Oshkosh police has reported occurring this month.

The department reported a shooting Aug. 2 in the 1000 block of Wisconsin Street. In that incident a 19-year-old

male victim was shot in the shoulder and was treated and released from the hospital.

Both shootings remain under investigation by OPD. Police believe both incidents are between two individuals.

No charges have been filed related to either case. However, a 17-year-old male has been arrested and booked into jail on potential charges of attempted homicide in the more recent incident.

State OKs demolishing three UWO buildings

The Wisconsin State Building Commission has approved the demolition of three buildings no longer used by the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

The commission approved \$110.2 million in key projects when it met at the Wisconsin State Fair last week. The UWO buildings are part of the 2023-25 multi-building demolition program. UWO will receive \$5.3 million from the state for the work to be done.

Two of the buildings set for demolition at UWO, aging residence halls Donner Hall and Webster Hall, have not been used by the university for a couple of years. The third building is Radford Hall that had faculty office space and the Student Health Center.

The Student Health Center is set to be relocated to Lincoln Hall.

The multi-building demolition program recognized the aging buildings at UWO, UW-Platteville and UW-Parkside.

Documents from the commission show the project will also fund renovating Lincoln Hall for the health center. This work will include architectural, plumbing, HVAC, electrical and technology updates as part of Lincoln Hall's renovation.

The commission stated the three residence halls are "beyond their useful lives and are no longer needed."

"The project reconfigures affected site utilities, lighting, parking, and pedestrian sidewalks serving adjacent remaining buildings, provides a campus green space and makes way for a future building at this site," the commission said.

All demolition, construction and updates are scheduled to be completed by December 2026.

Celebration of Lights driving force passes away

Leon Thompson, who played a leading role in running Oshkosh Celebration of Lights (COL) each year, passed away Aug. 3 at the age of 78.

Thompson was an integral part of COL's operations and development, serving as both president and most recently as vice president. Thompson served as a "Santa" as part of the display for several years.

"Just the perfect Santa Claus," said Ben Thompson, Leon's son. "He would never forget anyone's name and would remember things about people to give them little surprises when he'd see them."

Despite health limitations in recent years, Thompson continued to be involved in planning the event and giving back to the community, said COL president Norm Reichenberger.

"His leadership, passion and countless hours of dedication helped shape the magic and joy that so many experience each holiday season," Reichenberger said. "He will be forever remembered — and deeply missed."

Celebration of Lights will be in its 24th year this holiday season. The event started in Menominee Park before moving to the EAA grounds in 2023.

"I don't think in his wildest dreams he thought it would be as successful as it was going to be, especially after moving out to EAA," Reichenberger said.

The show now stretches 2.4 miles, helping attendance to reach over 22,000 cars each year, with over 6,000 kids visiting Santa and 22,000 pounds raised for the local food pantry in 2024.

Ben remembers his father for how much he cared for and helped others.

"He was somebody that really just never judged a book by its cover," Ben said. "He saw something good in everyone he met."

Thompson talked to everyone on the same level, Ben said.

"He had so many friends that were judges and politicians and janitors and he spoke to them all the same way," Ben said. "I learned that lesson as a kid — no matter someone's status, race or whatever — why should you talk differently to anyone?"

Reichenberger first knew Thompson as a teacher at what is now Oshkosh West High School. Thompson, who taught for

32 years, had a way of helping students reach their potential and encourage them to participate in activities they might not have otherwise. Reichenberger said that's a trait he saw continue in Thompson while they organized Celebration of Lights.

"He had a way of getting people involved like he did for everything else," Reichenberger said. "He knew what direction he wanted to take it."

Offering free nights for all community members to experience the event was important to Thompson, Reichenberger said.

"He wanted to give back to the community," Reichenberger said. "He wanted everybody to get to enjoy it. That was very important to him."

Thompson was involved in other aspects of the community, including coaching and officiating youth sports.

"I didn't realize how much he was into," Reichenberger said. "He never talked about what he was involved in doing but would do things to the best of his ability to help the community."

It's that kind of humbleness that others liked about Thompson, Ben said.

"There were so many people in his life that he would show up at their homes," Ben said. "His friends would drop everything when he'd show up unannounced just to sit and have a beer and talk with him."

While much of his focus was on giving back to the community, Ben said family still came first to his father. Thompson and his wife, Wendy, were married for 55 years.

"He gave everything to others and he focused on everyone else," Ben said. "His daily job would be to make my mom smile and never let that go."

To honor his memory, the Leon Thompson Youth Leadership Oshkosh Scholarship fund has been established through the Oshkosh Chamber.

"Leon built his legacy as a dedicated schoolteacher, mentor, role model and advocate for young people in our community," Chamber president and CEO Rob Kleman said. "This scholarship will carry forward his legacy by supporting high school students with leadership potential as they prepare to shape the future of Oshkosh."

Kleman also noted Ben recently completed the Leadership Oshkosh program — continuing his father's passion for community involvement and civic growth.

"This is a fitting tribute to a man who inspired so many to lead with integrity and heart," Kleman said.

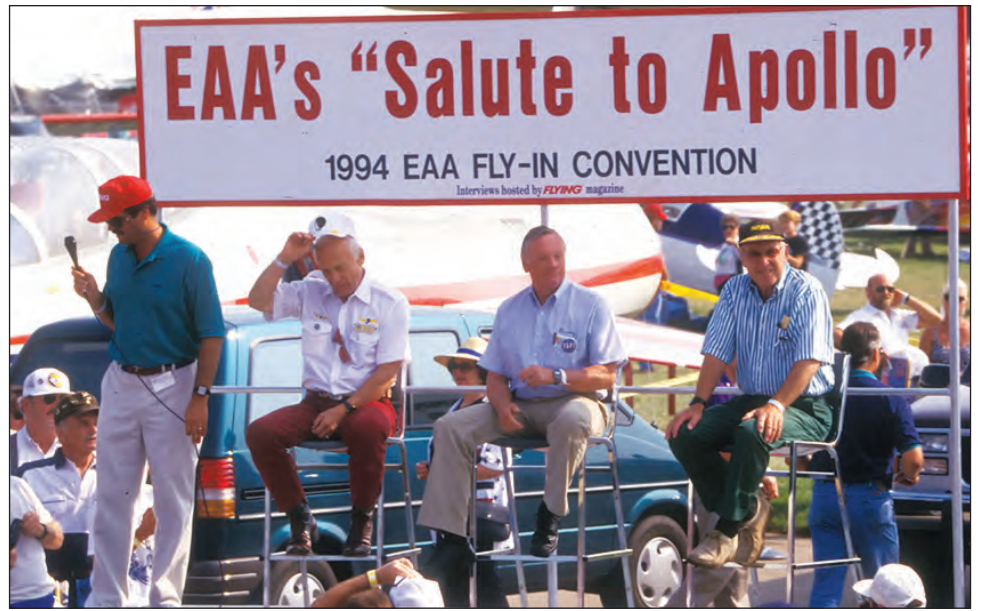

Lovell made frequent visits to Oshkosh

Astronaut James Lovell, who passed away Friday, is being remembered as a frequent visitor to Oshkosh for various events, including the EAA Fly-in Convention.

As an astronaut, Lovell took part on the Gemini and Apollo missions. He was also a longtime EAA member.

"Jim Lovell was a hero to many of us as we followed the exploits of America's space programs in the 1960s and '70s, and became known to new generations through the movie *Apollo 13*," said Jack J. Pelton, EAA's CEO and chairman of the board. "His calm demeanor and focus on the mission were invaluable as commander of the crippled spacecraft during that epic flight in 1970."

"We at EAA had a close connection

to him for decades, as he first met EAA founder Paul Poberezny in their mutual hometown of Milwaukee," Pelton said. "Jim was a regular visitor to Oshkosh for the EAA Fly-in Convention for many years and graciously retold his experiences as a Naval Aviator and an astronaut to our audiences on numerous occasions. We express our condolences to Jim's family and many friends, and say, Godspeed and thank you."

Lovell visited Oshkosh several times over the past 30 years, including as part of the Salute to Apollo at the 1994 EAA Fly-In Convention, the Apollo 13 anniversary at Oshkosh in 2015, the Apollo astronaut reunion during EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2017 and as the main speaker for the Wright Brothers Memorial Banquet virtual event in 2020.

Grants to expand children's health, disability services

New grant support will provide funding for children's health and disability services, along with language literacy programs, in the Oshkosh area.

Twelve organizations have been awarded grants totaling \$375,000 through the Otto Bremer Trust (OBT) Community Responsive Fund within the Oshkosh Area Community Foundation. OBT — a private charitable trust based in St. Paul, Minn. that has invested more than \$1 billion since 1944 in Minnesota, Montana, North Dakota and Wisconsin — works with regional intermediaries to expand its impact.

Grants were awarded to support work aligned with focus areas set by OBT: literacy, adoption and foster care services, children's health, children's disability services and mental health.

"This support from the Otto Bremer Trust goes a long way in our region," said Amy Putzer, OACF's Director of Programs. "These grants will help fill critical gaps, especially in the rural communities within our service area. And thanks to

our local knowledge and relationships, we're in a unique position to help these dollars reach the people and programs that need them most."

The Oshkosh Area Community Foundation (OACF) is one of several partners selected to distribute grants of up to \$75,000 through the 2025 OBT Community Responsive Fund in Wisconsin. Alongside the Community Foundation for the Fox Valley Region and the Greater Green Bay Community Foundation, the three foundations are helping distribute \$1.5 million across 10 counties.

Field day to showcase soil health, waterhemp practices

Grain farmer Todd Messerschmidt will host a Soil Health Field Day from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Aug. 21 at his farm, located at the corner of Wisconsin Highway 44 and County Road FF in Oshkosh.

The event, organized by the Winnebago County Land & Water Conservation Department (LWCD), is designed to share innovative, research-based practices for waterhemp management and soil conservation with farmers, landowners, and community members. Lunch will be provided for those who RSVP by calling 920-232-1952.

Messerschmidt is an active participant in the Soil Health Challenge, a county-led initiative that supports farmers in implementing and evaluating conservation practices aimed at improving soil structure, reducing runoff, and boosting long-term productivity.

He operates his family's corn and soybean farm and has been working with LWCD staff to address erosion issues that were creating gullies in some of his fields. Since adopting

no-till practices — which minimize soil disturbance by eliminating traditional plowing — Messerschmidt has seen improvement in soil stability and water retention. As part of the Soil Health Challenge, he is now also incorporating cover crops, which are planted between growing seasons to protect and enrich the soil.

Field Day topics will include:

- Effective strategies for managing waterhemp and palmer amaranth
- Combine cleanout practices to limit weed seed spread
- A producer-led discussion with the Muddy Bottom Farmers Watershed Group and Pheasants Forever
- The benefits of legume cover crops for soil health and savings
- An update on the Nitrogen Optimization Pilot Program (NOPP)
- An overview of the Soil Health Challenge and its countywide impact

Winnebago County LWCD staff encourage area farmers, landowners and conservation partners to attend, ask questions and explore how these strategies could benefit their own operations.

Oshkosh Chamber helps restaurants, retail thrive

Oshkosh has experienced a boom in new restaurant openings so far in 2025.

Following a number of longtime restaurant closures in the wake of the pandemic, more than 10 new restaurants have opened to serve hungry Oshkosh residents and visitors since January.

That list includes:

- Anchor & Port inside Marriott Waterfront Hotel at 1 N. Main St.
- Freddy's Frozen Custard & Steakburgers at 555 S. Washburn St.
- The Original Steaks & Hoagies at 520 S. Koeller St.
- Jersey Mike's Subs, its second Oshkosh location, at 2020 N. Jackson St.
- ChangMai at 1123 Oregon St. (the former Red's Pizza restaurant)
- Tropical Smoothie Café at 2312 Westowne Ave.
- Golden Nest Pancakes & Café at 1716 Oshkosh Ave.
- Zhou's Fresh Egg Rolls, a favorite at Oshkosh's Farmer's Market, opened shop at 393 Bacon Ave.
- El Komodoro at 715 N. Main St.
- 1890 Pub & Bistro at 958 W. Sixth Ave.
- Hanoi House & Boba at 200 City Center
- Indian Peaks Cuisine, a food truck featuring the tastes of India.

Another six restaurants are set to open by the end of 2025. In addition, legendary supper club The Roxy is currently undergoing a \$1 million-plus renovation project to enhance its kitchen space, dining room and modernize the overall building.

Oshkosh Chamber's economic development efforts have often played some role in the success of a number of restaurants across the community through assistance in selecting a location, guidance on permitting issues and business plan



development, and access to financing to help open the business.

For example, more than a dozen restaurants have received financing through the chamber's revolving loan fund, which provides startup or expansion capital to complement the restaurant owner's personal investment and any traditional lending from a financial institution. This gap funding often helps restaurant owners obtain the remaining dollars they need for an interior build out, kitchen equipment, dining room furnishings or working capital.

Since location is often important to the success of any restaurant, the chamber works closely with the area's commercial real estate professionals and property developers to ensure these business owners can best serve their customers.

The chamber's economic development team has provided similar entrepreneurial development service for a number of other retail establishments as well, making connections between funding opportunities, retail landlords and even local government services, when needed.

These restaurants and retailers add jobs and increase tax base in Oshkosh. Moreover, they diversify the menagerie of dining options in the community and make Oshkosh an even better place to live!

Oshkosh Chamber is proud of our economic development results and looks forward to continuing this important work to advance Oshkosh's economy. Jazz Festival to highlight national, local talent

With a stage located at the corner of North Main Street and Washington Avenue, the entire 400 block of Main Street in Oshkosh will be closed on Aug. 23 as the city hosts the fifth Oshkosh Jazz Festival.

The festival will build on a format that has been successful in the past, with a standing room area for dancers in front

of the stage while other festival-goers can choose to bring and set up lawn chairs on the sidewalks. Bars and restaurants on that block of Main Street will be open and DORA regulations will be in effect. Admission is free.

“It’s always been a great festival, so hey, let’s keep it rollin,’” said Michael Underwood, vice president of the OJF board that includes president Erin Boehme as well as volunteers Kris Larson, Carey Sharpe, Gretchen Herman, Kurt Shipe, Dave Damiani, Amy Albright, Allyson Schumacher and Lisa Krueger. “It’s an accessible show. We’ve made it a fun festival for everyone, not just jazz lovers.”

Underwood noted that the crowds have gotten bigger each year and that it includes “some people on lawn chairs listening intently as well as people who take the opportunity to go around and talk to people and have a basic good time.”

Emmy-nominated trumpeter and vocalist Benny Benack III will serve as master of ceremonies and will also play a set with a band that includes a six-piece horn section. Known for his work with YouTube sensation Post Modern Juke Box, Benack’s extensive resume was bolstered this year when he placed first in the Downbeat Magazine’s Readers Poll for Rising Star Male Vocalist and placed eighth in the Rising Star Trumpet category.

“Bennie’s one of the most sought-after trumpet players in the world,” Underwood said, noting that his set will include a vocal by Damiani before he “heads over to Becket’s to host the after-festival party.”

Multi-faceted American pianist and composer Emmet Cohen is the headliner and will play with his trio. He is known for, among other things, “Live at Emmet’s Place,” a signature series of regular performances with his trio and special guests live-streamed from his New York apartment during the 2020 lockdown.

“Emmet is a famous New York City piano player who is one of the biggest young talents in jazz,” Underwood said. “He’s been doing world tours playing straight-ahead jazz and some stuff that’s a little outside.”

The lineup will also include Sal “The Voice” Valentinetti, a former finalist on “America’s Got Talent” and Barcelona-born vocalist, composer and multi-in-

strumentalist Mar Vilesca.

One of the highlights of this year’s festival will be a tribute to Oshkosh-born and long-time Winneconne resident John Harmon featuring some of Wisconsin’s best players.

“We try to keep it close to home,” Underwood said. “Yeah, we’re Wisconsin, but we’ve got some world-class people who can play with world-class players. And not just playing, playing well.”

Noting that “it’s time” for the Harmon tribute, Underwood added, “We’re proud of Oshkosh, so why not showcase our greatest players and perhaps our greatest player?”

Harmon is a member of the Wisconsin Area Music Industry (WAMI) Hall of Fame and Underwood calls him “the Godfather of Jazz in Wisconsin.”

The Harmon tribute will be anchored by drummer Mike Malone and bassist John Gibson. Four of Harmon’s former students, University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh Director of Jazz Studies Marty Robinson, UW-Stevens Point Director of Jazz Studies Matt Buchman, pianist Mike Kubicki and pianist Noah Harmon, John’s son, will each perform selections to honor their mentor. Harmon will then join Malone and Gibson to play some of his own compositions.

country with no legal re-entry.

He said these numbers show that ICE is not in Winnebago County rounding up individuals at restaurants or manufacturing facilities as is being reported in larger cities across the nation since the Trump Administration took steps to increase immigration enforcement.

“We turned people over to ICE in the past and never gave it a thought until January when all this, y’know ... hoopla started. And everybody is all upset about what is happening,” Matz said. “It’s been happening for a long time.”

Matz started working with the department in the county jail in 1999 and stated the department has been transferring indi-

viduals to ICE for at least 26 years.

ICE data going back six years shows that between 2019 and 2024 the department made 102 notifications to ICE. Matz explained to the Judiciary and Public Safety committee that the records for transferring individuals to ICE records were never maintained.

Matz called it as common as when individuals are transferred to Brown County or Milwaukee County departments.

He compared working with ICE to working with any other federal agency the sheriff’s office collaborates with including the FBI to track terrorists and the FBI internet crimes against children task force.

“We have worked with (the FBI) with people who maybe wanted to harm our country or the people within our country. That happens,” Matz said. “You don’t want me to stop doing that. This is no different.”

ACLU Wisconsin published a report in July titled “The Jail-to-Deportation Pipeline in Wisconsin” that addresses the 287(g) agreements that 13 law enforcement agencies have signed with ICE.

The report states there are around 162,000 immigrants living in the state who are not yet U.S. citizens. This year as of June 10, over 1,000 people have been detained under the 287(g) agreements across Wisconsin.

“Being booked into a county jail in Wisconsin very often starts a process that can end in deportation, even for minor violations, and even before conviction of a crime,” the report states.

Winnebago County Supervisor James Ponzer sits on the Judiciary and Public Safety committee and asked Matz why these people were detained. Matz responded that they were jailable offenses.

Matz admitted he doesn’t know the criteria ICE uses for who is taken into ICE custody after being notified by the sheriff’s office. He stated that he believes the people of the county elected him to do this job.

“We’re working with a federal law enforcement agency,” he said. “There have been no reports of going into restaurants, going into public places, going into businesses (to arrest people), that’s not happened here.”

Matz added these checks on individuals to see if ICE needs to be notified is only happening in the jail. Deputies are not conducting street checks on people and notifying ICE of any individuals who have not committed an offense that would land them in county jail.

“They have to have committed a jailable offense,” Matz said.

for the fastest access to a call south of the Fox River.

“We are currently working on plans to address the bridge closure,” Fire Chief Tim Heiman said.

The program used by the department utilizes GPS to dispatch the closest unit to the scene based on travel routes. The program is able to take road closures into account when selecting the unit that will be able to get to the scene fastest.

“We hope the closure provides minimal disruption but are in the process of evaluating alternative response profiles to address any gaps,” Heiman said.

The project is anticipated to decrease maintenance costs, improve the operations of the movable span and extend the life of

the bridge by replacing deteriorated and worn-out components.

For boaters on the Fox River, the navigation of the Main Street bridge will be maintained throughout the boating season, Oshkosh public works director James Rabe said. Although the bridge will be able to be opened and closed during construction, it is expected that some of the work will need to be done with the bridge closed.

Lunda Construction based in Black River Falls is the prime contractor for the Main Street bridge project.

WisDOT has plans for another one of Oshkosh’s bridges in 2028. The Jackson Street bridge is scheduled to be replaced with a high-level fixed bridge in three years.

The new bridge will have a 23-foot vertical clearance that will allow all boaters to pass under the bridge without a need for a lift span.

"Their presence is a visible reminder of school zones – a deterrent against reckless driving and speeding. Crossing guards enhance the feeling of safety and security within the community while serving as role models for many."

Crossing guards are assigned to an intersection or designated area, and they will need to maintain it before and after the school day. The assignments vary with time working but generally hours are from 7 to 8:15 a.m. and 2:30 to 4 p.m. Crossing guards commonly work 45 minutes to an hour before school and between 30 minutes to an hour and a half after school gets out.

Essential duties include supervising children crossing streets and intersections at their assigned posts along with seeing that children remain on the sidewalk until it's safe to cross.

Crossing guards will also have to safely enter the middle of a street or intersection with a handheld stop sign to control traffic and allow students to safely cross.

Mann said crossing guards will also be responsible for reporting any observed violations of the law and may subsequently be required to testify in a court of law as to their observations.

One of the most important duties is to "assist children as appropriate, while maintaining control of the assigned intersection," Mann said.

OPD employs 17 crossing guards to monitor busy intersections and pedestrian crossings across the city. There are currently 14 crossing guards employed. OPD is hoping to hire three new crossing guards.

Crossing guards must be at least 18 years old and have no felony convictions. Other necessary skills and abilities needed for the position is having the physical stamina to stand for an extended period of time, often under inclement weather conditions.

They must also have good judgement and be able to deal "effectively and courteously with people of all ages."

Crossing guards are a part-time hourly position with pay ranging from \$19.42-\$22.12.

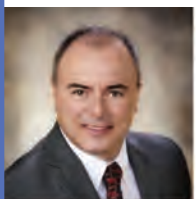

Dance studio owner travels to help residents of Malawi

Water is a basic human need, but for many in Malawi, it remains a daily struggle.

With a population of just over 20 million – around half of whom are children – access to clean water is far from guaranteed. Young women are often tasked with walking miles to gather water for their families, causing them to frequently miss school days.

WASH for Life, a humanitarian organization, sets out to build wells in underdeveloped communities, placing them near schools across Malawi to help get young women back in the classroom. WASH stands for Water, Sanitation and Hygiene, and their mission has already led to the construction of 52 new wells across the country.

WASH for Life wasn't alone on its most recent trip to Malawi. The organization traveled alongside GROGirls and Marquette University High School's Starfish Boys, two youth-led groups with similar goals.

In fact, WASH for Life's origins are directly tied to GROGirls – the organization was started by Tricia Bayer's husband's godfather Steve Hamer, who was inspired by his granddaughter's work with GRO-Girls and wanted to support a similar effort focused on water access.

Bayer, the owner of Richard's School of the Dance, recently returned from her first WASH for Life trip, which gave her the opportunity to teach dance in schools and manage the organization's social media presence.

She described the experience of teaching dance in Malawi as surprisingly familiar.

"I always say dance is a language of its own," Bayer said. "So it doesn't really matter what language you speak – everyone can do it."

The organizations brought Irish dance and culture to the Agape Orphanage, creating moments of joy that Bayer called "priceless."

"It was the most amazing thing to see their smiles and how much fun they were having," she said. "We were doing basic things, but they wanted to do it over and over and over again."

At two of the schools Bayer visited, students performed dances of their own to express gratitude for the clean water. She recorded the performances and plans to teach them to her students back home this fall.

Bayer also plans to continue fundraising to help Richard's School of the Dance contribute directly to WASH for Life's goal of raising \$8,000 – the cost to build one well.

Their first fundraiser brought in over \$1,000 through a 50/50 raffle at the studio's 76th Anniversary Show and by selling custom "WASH for Life" cookies made by Royal Cookies by Cindy.

As WASH for Life, GROGirls and MUHS Starfish Boys continue their efforts to bring clean water and brighter futures to Malawi, Bayer said community support remains essential.

Riverside Cemetery Chapel stands as historic place

The City of Oshkosh was incorporated in 1853 when the population was nearly 2,800.

The Locust Grove Cemetery, established in 1848 at the corner of Wisconsin Street and Algoma Boulevard, was too small by 1855 for the growing city. Land was purchased on the edge of the city for Riverside Cemetery on Algoma Boulevard overlooking the Fox River, expanding in 1882 and 1914 to almost 100 acres.



The Spanish flu pandemic in 1918-1920 precipitated the building of Riverside Cemetery Chapel and a large storage vault. A vault had been built in 1874 to store bodies, especially during the winter months when the frost line was so deep it was not possible to dig graves.

The Spanish Influenza from October 1918 through May 1919 claimed 116 lives in Oshkosh. During the 1920 influenza wave, 31 residents died in January and February. According to 1918 Influenza: A Winnebago County, Wisconsin Perspective by Teri Shores and Susan McFadden published in December 2009, "The deep snow, the solidly frozen ground, and the large number of deaths" made it impossible to dig graves as rapidly as needed.

A Letter to the Editor printed in the Oshkosh Daily Northwestern on Feb. 9, 1920 vividly describes it, "Conditions at Riverside Cemetery the last few weeks have been a disgrace, a shame and outrage. Bodies have been stacked away in the vault like so much cord wood with no regard for the memory of the dear ones whose bodies had to lie there."

The Cemetery Board members were in favor of taking immediate steps to deal with this problem.

The board unanimously approved Oshkosh architect Julius F. Dreger's plans for a chapel and a vault that could accommodate 200 bodies.

The Romanesque Revival Chapel, designed by Julius F. Dreger was built by Fluor Bros. Construction in 1921. The exterior of the T-shape building features walls of locally quarried, rock-faced limestone, parapet gables, stone buttresses, round-arched doors and windows surrounded by stone voussoirs, and an "Imperial" Spanish red tile roof.

Guests enter the chapel, which seats 132 persons, under a stone porte-cochere through arched double doors. The interior plaster walls are finished in soft tones which harmonize with the rich colors of the Oregon fir cedar hammered-beam ceiling. The green and earth-tone lead-glass windows are from the Baranowski Art Glass Company, based in Oshkosh, 1907-1927.

The floor is covered with octagonal tiles. Decorative bronze sconces and a pair of chandeliers provide lighting. Two mural-sized paintings, "The Resurrection" and "The Crucifixion" by local artist Gustav Behncke, donated by the artist and his wife, hang high above the chancel and on the wall above the entrance.

There are no wood partitions, making it practically fireproof, which was important in the 1920s. The Chapel was admired for its "solidity and permanency." Originally there was a "waiting station" where visitors could wait for the street car

or, later, the bus. It was razed in 1970. The first service was May 23, 1921, for Frank Percy.

Riverside Cemetery was listed on the State and National Register of Historic Sites in May 2003. This includes the 1920-21 Riverside Chapel and Vault, the 1936 garage, 32 mausoleums, the gate posts, the Soldier and Sailor Monument, the Burr/End of the Trail Monument, the G.A.R. Memorial, and one site (the cemetery itself).

The Landmarks Commission awarded the Acanthus Award in 2019 for restoration projects from 2006-2018: replacing the Imperial red, tile roof, the copper gutters and tuckpointing the masonry. In 2018 the interior damaged plaster and windows were restored, and the walls were prepared and painted. This was possible through donors and guidance from consultant, Terry Laib.

The goal of the Landmarks Commis-

sion for many years was for the chapel to be available for use by the Oshkosh community as it was originally intended. In 2019 the memorial service for Harold Buchholz, a former Landmarks chair, was held in the chapel.

Most people are familiar with the beautiful cemetery but are unaware of or have

never visited the 1921 Chapel. Donna Brotzke, Cemetery Sexton, welcomes visitors during office hours, 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday-Friday, while providing information and directions to the gravesites. May this historic chapel find new life and continue to serve Oshkosh for many centuries.

Leon A. Thompson

Leon A. Thompson, October 1946-August 3, 2025, age 78.

Pops, this is probably the only time we'll get away with such flattery—but we're not sorry. You earned every word, and this is a fitting way to honor you: the man we all

love, and now miss more than you'd ever have allowed. Until we meet again—your loving family.

Leon A. Thompson, affectionately known as: "T", "Mr. T", "Leonardo", "Lee", "Santa", "Pops," and "Grandpops", was a husband, father, grandfather, mentor, coach, teacher, and friend. But more than anything, he was a servant leader — a man who never asked for the spotlight, but whose light shone brightly in the lives of everyone he touched. He was the kind of man whose legacy can't be measured by titles or accolades — though he had those too. His life, from beginning to end, was centered on a simple, unwavering mission: to help others become the best version of themselves.

Born in October 1946 in Dane County, Wisconsin, Leon grew up with a quiet determination that guided him through every chapter of his life. One of his most remarkable qualities was his instinct to take action when he saw a need — he built programs to solve problems and uplift others.

He began his college career at UW-La Crosse, where he was one of the original 12 founding members of the Delta Sigma Phi Fraternity, affectionately known as "The Dirty Dozen." There, he formed friendships that would last a lifetime. He later transferred to UW-Oshkosh to earn both his Bachelor's and Master's degrees. While at UWO, he met the love of his life, Wendy, and in 1970 they began a marriage that would span over 55 years.

Leon pursued education not for prestige, but because he believed deeply in its power to transform lives. And for the next 32 years and 32 days, that's exactly what he did—as a teacher at Oshkosh West High School.

At Oshkosh West, he led Student Council and hosted leadership conferences, planting seeds of confidence and purpose in generations of students. He was named Educator of the Year, but those who knew him best will tell you — it was never about recognition. It was always about lifting others. At times, other teachers would shy away from students labeled as 'troublemakers' — but he was always happy to welcome them into his classes. He typically won them over, made a difference in their lives, and often gained lifelong friends in the process. He created a leadership program designed to build self-confidence and character, refusing to let negative labels define a student's potential. Leon had a gift for seeing the good in others and offering encouragement that could change a life.

Leon's coaching philosophy was rooted in heart. He founded the Junior and Senior Babe Ruth baseball programs in Oshkosh, as well as the Oshkosh Merchants baseball team. He selected players not solely based on skill, but on how deeply they wanted to play—for their shared love of the game and their commitment to growth. His teams, often underestimated, went on to play with grit, passion, and pride — and they won. He also coached for Oshkosh Youth Baseball and the Senior Babe Ruth traveling team, the Oshkosh Tornados.

Leon not only coached—he also donned referee stripes. To support his growing family with Wendy, and driven by his love of sports and camaraderie, he spent his evenings officiating football, baseball, and basketball games. He mentored many young men entering the world of officiating, always leading by example with professionalism, fairness, and integrity.

Even after retirement, Leon couldn't

sit still. He volunteered his time teaching computer classes to seniors, helping others stay connected in a fast-changing world. Whether it was a student, a colleague, or a stranger — Leon always showed up with humility and heart.

Leon's heart for service extended into the community. He brought joy to thousands each year through his leadership with Oshkosh's Celebration of Lights, working behind the scenes and donning the big red suit to make holiday magic happen. It was yet another way he gave of himself, living out his belief in generosity and connection.

As a husband, Leon had a sense of humor that didn't always land — but he always recovered thanks to Wendy's short-term memory and a wink of his twinkly blue eyes. He adored her endlessly and remained her biggest fan. Even in his final days, Wendy was his sunshine, and his daily mission was to make her smile during every visit.

As a father, Leon was encouraging, patient, and wise. He believed in teaching lessons that would stick — not through lectures, but with grace and purpose. He loved to travel out West with his boys and they always found plenty of adventures along the way. He supported his sons in all of their pursuits, and was always willing to help in any way he could. He instilled strength, humility, and love into his sons' lives by simply living it.

He was preceded in death by his parents, William and Beulah (Johnson) Thompson; his infant sister, Judith; and brothers Hollis and Richard Thompson. He is survived by his loving wife, Wendy; their children, spouses, and his beloved grandchildren.

A funeral service for Leon will be held at 10:30 am on Friday, August 15, 2025, at Martin Luther Church, 1526 Algoma Blvd. Oshkosh, WI 54901 officiated by Rev. Tom Voss. Visitation at the church will be held from 9:00 am until 10:30 am. Immediately following the funeral service, all are invited to Leon's celebration of life which will be held at LaSure's Banquet Hall, 3125 S. Washburn St, Oshkosh, WI 54904. 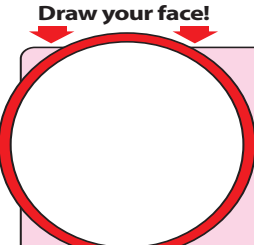
