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## City cancels Flock camera contract

Oshkosh officials voted to reject an agreement with Flock after the company's representatives appeared to mislead the council about certain capabilities of the camera system.

During a tense meeting with lots of public input, the Oshkosh Common Council approved a one-year contract with Flock despite objections from citizens on April 21.

In a 5-2 vote, the council voted to extend the Flock contract for one year.

Council members Jacob Amos and Alec Lefeber voted against the contract.

Oshkosh has used Flock since 2023 when the first contract was approved. Flock has 26 automatic license plate reader cameras in Oshkosh.

The city hall meeting room was packed with mostly people concerned about privacy and personal liberty with the cameras turned on 24/7 tracking every vehicle's movement through Oshkosh.

However, the next day Oshkosh Police Chief Dean Smith received new information and requested the council rescind

the action approving the contract and to direct staff to reject the Flock agreement.

Smith found out the morning after the council meeting from a staff member that Flock appeared to lie to the council during the meeting the night before. He said he didn't know if the statements were a lie on purpose or a mistake.

"I hold my conversations and recommendations to council as sacred," Smith said. "I know that you trust me to give you my best recommendations that are in the

## Common council moves closer to acquiring City Center

Members of the Oshkosh Common Council appear willing to pay \$12.5 million to acquire City Center. The public will now have two weeks to review the plan and then it will be voted on May 12 to go forward with the proposed purchase.

The council went into closed session for over an hour during a special meeting April 22 to discuss the dollar amount. That dollar amount is how much the city is offering to purchase City Center. The council did not make an offer to purchase

City Center at the meeting.

The public will now be able to review the acquisition, and then the plans will be discussed by the Plan Commission on May 5 and the council on May 12.

It is unknown exactly what was discussed during the executive session last week and the several other sessions that have taken place with council, community development and other staff members. What is known is that the Greater Oshkosh Economic Development Corporation (GOEDC) has played a major role in the meetings.

Tricia Rathermel, GOEDC's president and CEO, gave a presentation on the downtown development that is based on the revisioning downtown plan that the Oshkosh community development department put together in 2024.

Rathermel's presentation focused largely on the importance of a downtown area that attracts people and grows the tax base.


The City Center property is about 17 acres with over 100 feet on the Fox River riverfront. It opened as Park Plaza, a shopping mall, in 1970 with major retailers like Sears and JCPenney. In the 1990s the

owners noted the shift away from typical malls and started a rebrand effort to have more office space.

This led to City Center housing 4imprint's corporate headquarters, the Social Security office and E-Power Marketing. Other retail shops also joined City Center like Caramel Crisp and Planet Perk.

Rathermel stated that downtown development is able to generate two to three times more tax revenue per acre compared to big box stores like Walmart.



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# Chapel receives national historic recognition

The Peniel Welsh Chapel has been listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

The national listing, which was made April 9, comes after the chapel was listed last year in the Wisconsin State Register of Historic Places. The church, which is located at W9644 Zoar Road, was constructed in 1856 within the Oshkosh Welsh Settlement.

Large concentrations of Welsh people immigrated to the Lake Winnebago area through the end of the late 19th century. Peniel Church is located in the southern section of the Oshkosh Welsh Settlement.

In 1856, the southern Settlement region served as a religious and social center with the completion of Peniel Church. Welsh-language religious services, community events, festivals and social clubs were essential to expressing their Welsh identity.

Welsh life was centered around the church with daily gatherings and played an important role in preserving many aspects of Welsh culture, most notably

through annual festivals. The largest of these, the Gymanfa Ganu, or singing festival, is the longest-running known musical event in the state. It has been instrumental in preserving Welsh musical traditions, especially the practice of Welsh four-part congregational hymn singing.

The congregation disbanded in 1977; however, the church remained in use as a performance venue that continues to host the annual Gymanfa Ganu as well as other Welsh cultural and musical events. It stands today as representation of Welsh heritage.

### April 27, 1995

#### Local Aviation Pioneer and Flying Ace Killed in Crash:

Local aviation pioneer, Sylvester "Steve" Wittman, and his wife Paula, perished on Thursday when their plane experienced catastrophic failures and crashed in northern Alabama. The Wittmans were en route to Oshkosh from their winter home in Ocala, FL when the accident occurred. Early reports indicate the home-built plane apparently broke apart in mid-air. Long-time friends from Oshkosh Paul Poberezny, John Mark and Warren Basler flew to the site on Sunday to aid in the search for the missing plane. The 91-year-old Wittman had a story book of tales in his career as a pilot. He competed in and won more course races than anyone in history. Some of his planes are on exhibit today in the Smithsonian and also the EAA Museum in Oshkosh. His first air race sporting license was signed by Orville Wright. He also managed the Winnebago County Airport from its inception in 1931 until 1969. The airport became known as Wittman Field following his retirement.

Miyawaki method forces trees and shrubs to compete for space as they are densely planted.

The Miyawaki method was designed by Dr. Akira Miyawaki in the 1970s in an effort to restore native forests, degraded soils.

"There hasn't been a lot of research on this method, but it is gaining popularity," Derks said.

Derks added the recent planting could also help control buckthorn growth in the area.

Akan Acres formerly was full mainly of ash trees. Those trees began to die off, but now this year's planting should bring life back into the space.

## New council members sworn in

New elected members Jacob Amos, Alec Lefeber and Paul Esslinger were sworn in as part of the 2026-27 Oshkosh Common Council. The trio was sworn in at private ceremonies earlier this month prior to the council meeting April 21.

The council rearranged the meeting calendar last year and no longer meets twice a month. The council also canceled the re-organization meeting, which typically is held at noon the Tuesday after the election.

This is because state statute requires newly elected members to be sworn in within 10 days following the election.

During that time, Oshkosh technically had nine council members.

Incumbents DJ Nichols and Jacob Floam decided not to run for reelection after both serving a single term. Amos was appointed to the board by the council in November, following the resignation of Kris Larson.

Nichols did not attend the meeting, but Floam did and spoke about his time on the council and Oshkosh.

"This is a fantastic community to live in," Floam said. "This is a fantastic community to work in. This has been a wonderful council to serve with."

## County board approves virtual committee meeting attendance

Emergencies come up and county board supervisors and citizen members serving on committees, task forces and commissions cannot always attend meetings in person. After a vote April 21 by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, they now have a new option — remote attendance.

The county board approved a motion to approve a rule allowing commission and committee members to attend a meeting by remote videoconference with full rights to participate, vote and count toward quorum. The person attending the meeting remotely will need to keep the camera on for the entirety of their attendance. The committee chair must approve the remote attendance in advance.

Supervisor Kate Hancock-Cooke, who brought the motion to the floor from an ad hoc rules committee, said providing more options for people to attend and participate in the meetings was important. The rule would also avoid meetings being canceled at the last minute due to a lack of quorum.

"This isn't for an everyday type of thing," she said. "It's for an emergency — like you're sick — or the committee chair knows they may not have a quorum and they call the county board chair to sit in to get to that quorum."

Supervisor Tim Macho said he had heart surgery and would have wanted to participate in committee meetings while he was recovering at home.

"My brain was working fine," he said. "I could have easily sat in and voted from home."

The motion passed after supervisors defeated a rule that would have allowed

virtual attendance at county board meetings. Hancock-Cooke said that rule would help reduce barriers to potential candidates who may be interested in running for county board but worried about being in person for all the meetings.

Several supervisors spoke about the importance of being able to gather face-to-face and build camaraderie.

"We owe it to our constituents, and we owe it to each other to be here," said Supervisor George Bureau. "When the public comes to a meeting, they want to see their supervisors. Do we want to pay our supervisors to sit at home in their PJs?"

Supervisor Tim Paterson said, "90% of the job is showing up. If a vote is important, you'll find a way to show up. If you can't show up, then you can't make it."

**New board leadership:** The new county board was sworn in April 21. With the new board, supervisors voted for board leadership. Previous county board chair Thomas Egan opted not to run for the position again.

For chair, Frank Frassetto from District 32 was elected over Shiloh Ramos from District 5. Ramos previously served as board chair from 2018 to 2022.

"I promise I won't get in the way of doing the good work of this board. I will make sure everyone will have a time to speak their piece," said Frassetto, who is also the chair of the Town of Black Wolf. "It's an honor and privilege to serve as the county board chair."

Vice chair Chuck Farrey decided not to seek reelection to the board. Conley Hanson from District 26 defeated Ramos for the role of vice chair. As vice chair, Hanson said he "will support the chairman and pay attention to the rules and make sure all the voices are heard."

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# Gold Cross Ambulance station will be coming to Oshkosh

A new station for Gold Cross Ambulance Service is being planned to serve an area near the new ThedaCare Medical Center-Oshkosh.

Froedtert ThedaCare said it supports the project to establish the new emergency medical service station and living space for Gold Cross at 356 W. Sixth Ave. The building is located near the new medical center at 250 W. Sixth Ave., which opened in January.

The goal is to meet the growing demand for emergency care and response in the region.

“In an emergency, minutes matter,” said Jenny Nikolai, Vice President of ThedaCare Medical Centers-Fond du Lac and Oshkosh. “That’s why having a comprehensive health care system and an advanced emergency department is more than a convenience – it’s a lifeline for a community. It means patients and families have access to seamless care from the moment they arrive through recovery.”

The EMS building is a former service/filling station. It also served as an office and home base for contractors, as well as a residence. The space is being converted by ThedaCare to expand access and meet the

needs of the community.

This location will allow Gold Cross to better serve communities in Oshkosh, Berlin and Fond du Lac. The space will include a single ambulance bay, work areas, medical supply storage, two sleeping rooms and a kitchen area.

“Choosing to restore this historic building rather than demolish it or build somewhere new reflects a deeper commitment to our community’s identity,” said Nikolai. “By investing in its restoration, we’re preserving

a sense of familiarity while giving it new purpose for generations to come. Revitalizing a space people already know and value strengthens the fabric of our community.”

Thanks to a donor to the ThedaCare Family of Foundations, Bergstrom Automotive Oshkosh dealerships, crews began work at the site, launching the project in early March.

“We understand the life-saving importance of rapid emergency response, and we are proud to play a role in strength-

ening Oshkosh’s emergency services,” said John Bergstrom, executive chairman of Bergstrom Automotive and Foundation-Neenah Board Member. “Our dedication is rooted in making Oshkosh a safer, healthier community for all.”

Gold Cross Ambulance Service is a regional emergency service provider in northeast Wisconsin, co-owned by ThedaCare and Ascension Wisconsin. Gold Cross operates 21 ambulances across a 1,200-square-mile area, collaborating with their owner hospital systems on emergency care, community paramedicine and patient transfers for improved care coordination.

In 2025, Gold Cross moved to a temporary location in Oshkosh, on the west side of the city, signing a one-year lease for the location.

Research shows that nearly 73% of Oshkosh residents live east of Interstate 41, while most of the current health care services are located west of I-41, meaning east-side residents are more than 15 minutes away from a hospital or emergency room. This can also impact ambulance response times.

The emergency medical service station is expected to be completed in September.

# Koeller Street Taco Bell closed for repairs following structural fire

A structural fire April 20 at one of the Taco Bell buildings in Oshkosh has forced the restaurant to close in order for the damage to be assessed and repairs completed.

The Oshkosh Fire Department was dispatched to 1140 S. Koeller St. just before 4

p.m. for reports of smoke coming from the roof of Taco Bell.

When crews arrived, they noted an active fire in the attic of the building. The department quickly initiated an aggressive interior and roof operation to contain the fire. Firefighters were able to bring the fire under control within 15 minutes of arrival, which OFD said likely prevented the

fire from spreading into the dining and kitchen areas of the restaurant.

There were no reported injuries. All employees were safely evacuated before the fire department arrived.

The preliminary investigation indicated that the fire was confined to the attic space of the restaurant. OFD reported smoke and water damage in the interior of the

restaurant, which had been undergoing renovations and was open to drive-thru customers only at the time of the incident.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation.

## Water levels rising leads to state of emergency

Heavy rainfall earlier this month has led to concerns about rising river levels and the potential for flooding in Oshkosh and surrounding areas.

The Wolf River flooded in recent weeks, leading to Shiocton and New London being evacuated. That water shed feeds into Lake Winnebago.

Oshkosh's engineering and utilities director James Rabe said the Fox River has significantly risen since the flooding started.

"We've been seeing some very significant increases," Rabe said.

The city declared a state of emergency starting Thursday afternoon as the water levels continued to rise. By Monday, a portion of North Campbell Road was closed due to water blocking the road near the mouth of Campbell Creek and the Fox River.

Rabe said sandbags were being filled by city staff and available to the public in anticipation of the water levels of the lake flooding local areas in Oshkosh. Sandbags were available at the former Armory building, 221 N. Sawyer St., and the Oshkosh Seniors Center, 234 N. Campbell Road.

Public Works Operations staff monitored supplies at both locations and were restocking as needed.

"Low lying areas are going to experi-

ence some flooding," Rabe said. "Certainly, right now in the areas along Sawyer Creek."

As water levels increased in Lake Winnebago, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Chicago District ordered all the gates with the lake's discharge to be open. That operation is in accordance with the Corps' water control manual.

Rabe said they were at a minor flood stage over the weekend with forecasts for the water to continue rising.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers anticipated Lake Winnebago cresting on Monday.

The gauge station on Lake Winnebago is how Rabe and the engineers track water levels. He said the water is normally about 2.9 feet to 3.2 feet above the gauge station. It was at 3.75 feet above the station and minor flood stage is 3.70.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers believed the lake will crest at 3.8 and 4.0 feet above the gauge station. In one week, the lake rose about nine inches and the forecast called for it to get even higher.

Residents are also encouraged to take precautions around their property:

- Use care when handling sandbags, which weigh about 50 pounds each.
- Turn off power in areas where flooding may occur, if safe to do so.
- Move batteries, hazardous materials and electrical devices out of areas that may flood.

## Defense lawyers submit brief in Lindemann appeal

An outside group has submitted a brief in the Jason Lindemann boat crash appeal case. The group states the judge erred in not allowing a change of venue and is asking the appeals court to reverse his felony convictions.

The brief was written and filed earlier this month by Megan Sanders on behalf of the Wisconsin Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers (WACDL).

Lindemann, 55, was found guilty at a jury trial last summer on two felony counts of second-degree recklessly endangering safety for his role in his speed boat crashing into the On the Loos paddlewheel boat in July 2022.

The WACDL brief is the third filing in the appeal after Lindemann's appeals attorney Joseph Bugni filed his brief in December asking for a new trial and the state's response to that request from assistant attorney general Michael Sanders.

Bugni made a similar conclusion to what the WACDL brief states, which is that Winnebago County Circuit Court Branch 4 Judge Michael Gibbs should have allowed the defense's initial motion for a change of venue.

Sanders points out in her brief that pre-trial publicity raised concerns that a Winnebago County jury could remain impartial to the case.

"Lindemann's community was sufficiently against him that drawing his jury from Winnebago County violated his due process rights," Sanders wrote.

The Herald reported at the time that Lindemann's trial attorney Scott Ceman filed a motion for a change of venue in the case stating there was overwhelming bias and misinformation in media reports about the case.

## Oshkosh woman pleads not guilty in theft case

A former credit union president and CEO who allegedly misused over \$1.5 million over 25 years is facing prison time if found guilty of financial crimes.

Michele M. Spanbauer earlier this month pled not guilty to a sole count of fraud against financial institution - exceeding \$100,000.

Spanbauer, 85, walked with a cane to the defense table along with an over-ear hearing aid inside the Winnebago County Courthouse.

She remains out of custody on a \$5,000 signature bond set by Court Commissioner Eric Heywood during Spanbauer's initial appearance on March 30.

If convicted, Spanbauer could be sentenced to 10 years in state prison followed by a maximum of five years of extended supervision.

Court documents allege Spanbauer opened over 100 bogus loans over 25 years when she was president and CEO of

During the hearing when the motion was argued, the prosecution did not argue to have the case stay in Winnebago County. Gibbs responded that the case would stay in his court and that the court would use a larger jury pool to ensure an unbiased jury in Winnebago County.

The second part of the WACDL brief addressed prejudicial circumstances, social sciences and voir dire also known as the jury selection process.

Megan Sanders cites a 1975 psychological study titled "Authoritarianism, pretrial publicity, and awareness of bias in simulated jurors" in the brief that looked at the impact of pretrial publicity on jurors.

"Simply put, jurors cannot discount the contents or tenor of pretrial publicity when they say they can," Megan Sanders said.

When looking at social science literature, Sanders says, the only remedy to the pretrial publicity is to move the trial to another county.

The WACDL brief does not make a recommendation of where the trial should have been held.

Megan Sanders makes a request in the brief that Lindemann's felony convictions be reversed. Lindemann's own attorney doesn't make that request. In Bugni's brief, he requests a new trial to prove Lindemann's innocence.

Megan Sanders concluded, "State and federal precedent and the social science research all dictate the same conclusion: when inflammatory pretrial publicity pervades a community, voir dire is an ineffective means of producing an untainted jury."

There are no scheduled hearings in this case. If the case does move forward, it will be heard by a panel of three appeals judges.

Oshkosh Postal Employees Credit Union. Spanbauer provided a written statement to police regarding her actions at the credit union in 2025 before charges were filed.

According to the statement, Spanbauer heard the credit union may have to merge with another institution because it did not have enough loans.

"I then decided to create a loan that was bogus in order to boost the number of credit union loans and I then started to create bogus or fake loans in order to keep the credit union open," Spanbauer's statement says in the complaint.

In an effort to make the credit union appear more profitable, Spanbauer would allegedly open four to five loans in the name of a dead person. She would then use the money from the bogus loans to pay off other loans.

These actions were allegedly repeated systematically over the next 25 years. The reporting party in the criminal complaint did not have any evidence that Spanbauer used the fraudulent funds for personal use.

The National Credit Union Administrative Board (NCUAB) filed an administrative order last year stating Spanbauer was responsible for approximately \$1.7 million in losses for her employer.

The NCUAB found that from December 1997 to March 2025, Spanbauer was president and CEO of Oshkosh Postal Employees Credit Union, which has since merged with Community First Credit Union.

Spanbauer is scheduled to be back in court on June 11.

best interest of the city with the information that I have available to me. I will not betray that trust because of this misrepresentation, specifically to a question asked by a council member. I can no longer recommend Flock.”

During meeting April 21, council member Brad Spanbauer asked a number of specific questions to Flock’s chief information security officer, Chris Castaldo, about the system’s capabilities to create a pattern of life with the cameras and additionally a heat map of vehicles movements.

“No, it does not,” Castaldo said via a zoom call. “No, it does not create a pattern of life.”

At this point, resident Mehliia Hauxwell shouted, “Liar!” from inside the meeting room and was escorted out.

Then Christian MacLeod, Flock’s senior public affairs manager, repeated the alleged lie.

“No, that is not available,” MacLeod said when Spanbauer asked her directly about a heat map.

Smith went into work the next morning and was informed by a staff member that the Flock system does create a heat map and a pattern of life of vehicles. He then met with City Manager Rebecca Grill and explained the situation to her. Smith also called each member of the council to tell them what had happened.

During a special meeting April 22, the council voted 7-0 to rescind their previous decision and direct staff to reject the contract. The council is also looking to strengthen the automatic license plate reader policy and possibly set up a board or commission to ensure the policy is best for the police and the citizens.

“The common theme that I have heard through discussion is that the community trusts the police department and the city, but they do not trust Flock,” Smith said.

Last week the Flock cameras were covered up with plastic, it’s unknown when they’ll be removed.

Flock operates its automatic license

plate reader cameras in over 5,000 communities with over 80,000 cameras. Castaldo said the company has just 23 cyber-security experts to oversee the entire system but hopes that number would be 30 experts in the future.

Communities across Wisconsin and the nation have been canceling Flock contracts, including Sturgeon Bay. The Sturgeon Bay Common Council voted to end its Flock contract the same night Oshkosh officials voted to renew its contract.

There has been a national spotlight on the Flock cameras, which allegedly only capture the back of a vehicle. Flock officials state the system only reads the license plate, but critics have argued it makes a profile of the vehicle. This includes tracking vehicles and noting when vehicles have dents or bumper stickers.

The issue has even reached the nation’s capital in November when two lawmakers urged the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to investigate Flock’s actions to protect Americans’ personal data

“Flock has received vast sums of taxpayer money to build a national surveillance network,” Congressman Raja Krishnamoorthi and Senator Ron Wyden wrote in their letter to FTC Chair Andrew Ferguson. “But Flock’s cavalier attitude towards cybersecurity needlessly exposes Americans to the threat of hackers and foreign spies tapping this data. Accordingly, we urge the FTC to hold Flock accountable for its negligent cybersecurity practices.”

In Wisconsin there are a number of cases, including in Menasha where male officers used the system to track romantic partners and former partners’ movements.

Companies and groups are fighting Flock, including deflock.org, which is an open-source map that shows where Flock cameras are and havebeenflocked.com, where license plates can be entered to see if somebody has been tracked or searched in the Flock system.

According to deflock.org, Oshkosh has joined almost 60 cities across the country rejecting these ALPRs.

According to GO-EDC, the large stores in northwest Oshkosh – Walmart, Lowe’s, Festival Foods and Menards – are generating \$787,394 in tax revenue in 2026 spread over 62.7 acres. That ends up being about \$12,500 per acre of tax revenue.

Rathermel compared that to the east side of the 400 block of North Main Street in downtown Oshkosh, which is generating \$121,691 tax revenue in 2026 on 3.5 acres for an average of \$34,769 per acre of tax revenue.

“Downtown truly does generate really good investment for our area,” she said.

Rathermel said that if the city buys City Center, 101 Commerce Street and 201 Pearl Avenue, it will have immediate control of the site and will allow for a phased redevelopment over several years.

This timeline falls in line with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation plan to build a new high-level fixed bridge to replace the Jackson/Oregon Street bridge in 2028.

The redevelopment goals includes increasing traffic to the site with year-round activities, increasing property values and

expanding the tax base and connecting Oshkosh’s downtown with the riverfront.

GO-EDC was instrumental in the Oshkosh Avenue corridor redevelopment project. That project began with Oshkosh Corp. building its global headquarters on the former city-owned golf course.

That redevelopment has seen national businesses like Hilton hotels, Dunkin Donuts, Popeye’s Chicken and Starbucks, but also local restaurants such as Parm and The Taqueria.

“We’ve done this before, and we know that we can do it,” Rathermel said.

The approximate 17 acres along Oshkosh Avenue now has an assessed value of \$45.3 million and annual tax revenue of \$840,000.

The listing price for City Center is close to \$30 million and the site was assessed at \$17 million, which is the taxable value of the site.

There are grant opportunities available to help finance the project. Representatives from the Oshkosh Chamber of Commerce, the Oshkosh Area Community Foundation and Discover Oshkosh attended the meeting to show their support for the acquisition and the redevelopment.

Rathermel said the timeline includes additional reviews of the building before acquiring the property and at that time officials would work with tenants on what’s next for them.

Ken Osmond, owner of Planet Perk,

said there are 22 businesses currently at City Center and that the city needs to understand City Center is not vacant.

“This won’t happen overnight. It will take time,” Rathermel said. “With a very good plan and effort we don’t have to have this take decades, we can do this in years.”

The phased redevelopment strategy would start in 2027.

Rathermel added that there could be an opportunity to have a municipal building included in the development of the 17 acres.

“A municipal complex could benefit the site overall,” she said.

Rathermel added Milwaukee and New Richmond built community libraries on the first floor of their city halls with housing above.

However, City Manager Rebecca Grill and several council members made it clear they do not support putting City Hall on

the site.

“My strong feeling is that if City Hall is close to the waterfront, that is not the highest and best use of the property,” Grill said. “We have potential, amazing opportunity for riverfront property... I will not be advocating for that.”

There are no plans for what will go into the space for redevelopment as the council was not allowed to talk during the closed sessions about specific use of the space.

Newly elected Paul Esslinger has not been involved in the executive sessions and was unclear what was being voted on during the April 22 special meeting. He added these decisions should not be made behind closed doors without the taxpayers’ input.

“This should be rolled out to the public,” Esslinger said. “This is the cart way before the horse on this.”

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# Competitive nature fuels Oshkosh North's Anderson

Jackson Anderson made a strong connection with the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh baseball program early in his life.

He was the team's bat boy.

The former bat boy will soon find himself stepping into the batter's box for the Titans.

A versatile three-sport athlete at Oshkosh North, Anderson has made a commitment to play Division 3 college baseball next year at UW-Oshkosh.

A middle infielder who can play short-stop and second base with the versatility to pitch and man center field, Anderson is one of the better returning players in the Fox Valley Association. He received all-FVA honorable mention as a junior.

Anderson is the Spartans' only returning senior starter and North coach Dylan Pease is hoping that Anderson's competitive nature will impact his youthful team.

"The number one trait Jackson has showed me is that he's an elite competitor," said Pease. "With a team of young players who are still learning, we're incredibly fortunate to have Jackson showing them what it means to expect to win when they step onto the field."

As a prominent starter on a North football team that reached Level 3 of the WIAA Division 2 playoffs and a Spartans basketball squad that was a WIAA state qualifier during the 2024-25 season, Anderson has learned how to compete... and win.

"I'm competitive not only in sports, but pretty much everything I do," said Anderson. "If I'm doing something, I'm trying to win."

Anderson's competitive nature was forged during his childhood. He played backyard sports with his younger brother, Brady, and countless games of one-one basketball in the family driveway.

"It was really cool having a sibling to play sports with," said Anderson. "We had a lot of family competition. We'd play hoops in the driveway almost every day and sometimes we'd lower the hoop and

get some dunks in. I was older and never took it easy on him, but he definitely appreciates it now."

Jackson and Brady, a sophomore at North, were both starting guards for a strong Spartans hoops team that finished 18-9 overall and 11-7 in the FVA.

Jackson averaged 14.7 points, 2.8 re-

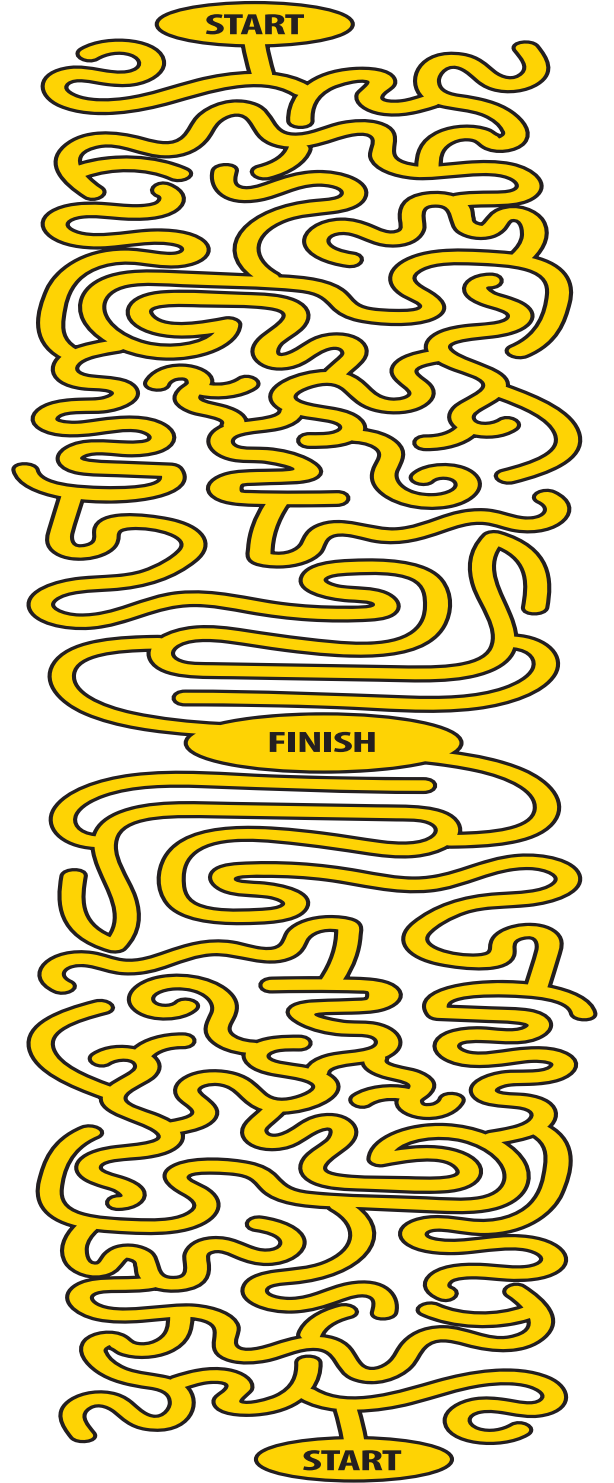

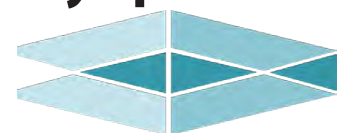
